CERTIFICATE OF WATER RIGHT

This Is to Certify, That FRANK B. RITCHEY

of Freewater, State of Oregon, has a right to the use of
the waters of Walla Walla River

for the purpose of Irrigation, domestic and stock

and that said right has been confirmed by decree of the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for Umatilla County, and the said decree entered of record at Salem, in the Order Record of the STATE ENGINEER, in Volume 12, at page 9; that the priority of the right thereby confirmed dates from 1885;

that the amount of water to which such right is entitled, for the purposes aforesaid, is limited to an amount actually beneficially used for said purposes, and shall not exceed one and one-half miner's inches per acre measured at the point of diversion.

A description of the lands irrigated under such right, and to which the water is appurtenant (or, if for other purposes, the place where such water is put to beneficial use), is as follows:

4.2 acres in SW $\frac{1}{4}$ NE $\frac{1}{4}$
Section 2

T. 5 N., R. 35 E. W. M., being within the E $\frac{1}{2}$ of the following described tract: Beginning at a point on the west line of Sec. 2, T. 5 N., R. 35 E. W. M., 50 ft. south of the intersection of said west line of Sec. 2, with the center line of OWR&N Co.'s railroad track, and running thence south along said west line 43 rods; thence east 29 rods; thence north to a point 50 ft. distant from the center line of said railroad track; thence northwesterly parallel with said railroad track and 50 ft. distance from the center line to the point of beginning.

AND said right shall be subject to all other conditions and limitations contained in said decree.

The right to the use of the water for irrigation purposes is restricted to the lands or place of use herein described.
