## CERTIFICATE OF WATER RIGHT

## This Is to Certify, That C. E. HANKINSON

of Route 2, Hillsboro, State of Oregon, of a right to the use of the waters of Rock Creek

a tributary of Tualatin River

for the purpose of

irrigation
under Permit No. 20063 of the State Engineer, and that said right to the use of said waters
has been perfected in accordance with the laws of Oregon; that the priority of the right hereby
confirmed dates from January 1, 1951

that the amount of water to which such right is entitled and hereby confirmed, for the purposes aforesaid, is limited to an amount actually beneficially used for said purposes, and shall not exceed 0.24 cubic foot per second

or its equivalent in case of rotation, measured at the point of diversion from the stream.

The point of diversion is located in the SWAWA, as projected within Thomas Stewart

DLC #13, Section 9, Township 1 South, Range 2 West, W. M.

The amount of water used for irrigation, together with the amount secured under any other right existing for the same lands, shall be limited to one-eightieth of one cubic foot per second per acrer its equivalent for each acre irrigated and shall be further limited to a diversion of not to exceed 2½ acre feet per acre for each acre irrigated during the irrigation season of each year,

and shall

conform to such reasonable rotation system as may be ordered by the proper state officer.

A description of the place of use under the right hereby confirmed, and to which such right is appurtenant, is as follows:

22.0 acres in the SW4NW4
3.0 acres in the SE4NW4
Section 9
Township 1 South, Range 2 West, W. M.
both as projected within T. Stewart DIC #43

The right to the use of the water for the purposes aforesaid is restricted to the lands or place of use herein described.
