for the purpose of the irrigation of 214 acres of land, domestic and stock use.

and that said right has been confirmed by decree of the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for Umatilla County, and the said decree entered of record at Salem, in the Order Record of the State of Oregon, in Volume 1, at page 250; that the priority of the right hereby confirmed dates from 1864 for 1.03 cubic feet per second, and 1898 for 3.04 cubic feet per second,

that the amount of water to which such right is entitled and hereby confirmed for the purpose saforesaid, is limited to an amount actually beneficially used for said purpose, and shall not exceed 4.07 cubic feet per second, and shall be subject to all other conditions and limitations contained in said decree.

A description of the lands irrigated under such right, and to which the water hereby confirmed is appurtenant, or, if for other purposes, the place where such water is put to beneficial use, is as follows: 40 acres in the Northeast quarter; 40 acres in the Northeast quarter; 40 acres in the Southeast quarter of Northeast quarter; 40 acres in the Southeast quarter of Northeast quarter; 10 acres in the Northeast quarter of Northwest quarter; 4 acres in the Southeast quarter of Northwest qu

The right to the use of the water aforesaid hereby connemed is restricted to the lands or place of use herein described.
