CERTIFICATE OF WATER RIGHT

This Is to Certify, That **THOMAS T. WHEELER**

of **Denton Park Resort, Fort Klamath**, State of **Oregon**, has made proof to the satisfaction of the STATE ENGINEER of Oregon, of a right to the use of the waters of **Waters Creek**

a tributary of **Slate Creek (Applegate River)** for the purpose of domestic use of one family including the irrigation of not to exceed one-half acre lawn and garden under Permit No. **31606** of the State Engineer, and that said right to the use of said waters has been perfected in accordance with the laws of Oregon; that the priority of the right hereby confirmed dates from **May 17, 1966**

that the amount of water to which such right is entitled and hereby confirmed, for the purposes aforesaid, is limited to an amount actually beneficially used for said purposes, and shall not exceed **0.01 cubic foot per second**

or its equivalent in case of rotation, measured at the point of diversion from the stream. The point of diversion is located in the **NE $\frac{1}{4}$ SE $\frac{1}{4}$, Section 8, T. 37 S., R. 7 W., W. M.** Diversion points located: **30 feet South and 210 feet East; 90 feet South and 220 feet East; both from NW Corner, NE $\frac{1}{4}$ SE $\frac{1}{4}$, Section 8.**

The amount of water used for irrigation, together with the amount secured under any other right existing for the same lands, shall be limited to - - - - - of one cubic foot per second per acre,

and shall conform to such reasonable rotation system as may be ordered by the proper state officer.

A description of the place of use under the right hereby confirmed, and to which such right is appurtenant, is as follows:

The right to the use of the water for the purposes aforesaid is restricted to the lands or place of use herein described.
