CERTIFICATE OF WATER RIGHT

This Is to Certify, That

FORT HILL LUMBER COMPANY

of P.O. Box 186, Grand Ronda, State of Oregon, 97347, has made proof to the satisfaction of the Water Resources Director, of a right to the use of the waters of South Yamhill River

a tributary of Willamette River for the purpose of sawmill use including sprinkling log decks and maintenance of fire suppression system

under Permit No. 36783 and that said right to the use of said waters has been perfected in accordance with the laws of Oregon; that the priority of the right hereby confirmed dates from August 7, 1972

that the amount of water to which such right is entitled and hereby confirmed, for the purposes aforesaid, is limited to an amount actually beneficially used for said purposes, and shall not exceed 1-11 cubic feet per second

or its equivalent in case of rotation, measured at the point of diversion from the stream. The point of diversion is located in the NEX SWk, Section 9, T. 6 S., R. 7 W., W. M., 2490 feet North and 1330 feet East from SW Corner, Section 9.

The amount of water used for irrigation, together with the amount secured under any other right existing for the same lands, shall be limited to ______of one cubic foot per second per acre,

and shall

conform to such reasonable rotation system as may be ordered by the proper state officer.

A description of the place of use under the right hereby confirmed, and to which such right is appurtenant, is as follows:

NET SWE Lot 3 (NWE SEE) Section 9 T. 6 S., R. 7 W., W. M.

The right to the use of the water for the purposes aforesaid is restricted to the lands or place of use herein described, and is subject to the existing minimum flow policies established by the Water Policy Review Board.
