CERTIFICATE OF WATER RIGHT

This Is to Certify, That

OREGON DEPARTMENT OF FISH AND WILDLIFE

of P. O. Box 3503, Portland, State of Oregon, 97208, has made proof to the satisfaction of the Water Resources Director, of a right to the use of the waters of Three Rivers and reservoir constructed under Permit No. R-6270

a tributary of Nestucca River
fish culture

for the purpose of

under Permit No. 39145 and that said right to the use of said waters has been perfected in accordance with the laws of Oregon; that the priority of the right hereby confirmed dates from April 17, 1974

that the amount of water to which such right is entitled and hereby confirmed, for the purposes aforesaid, is limited to an amount actually beneficially used for said purposes, and shall not exceed 0.02 cubic foot per second

or its equivalent in case of rotation, measured at the point of diversion from the stream. The point of diversion is located in the Lot 4 (NW $\frac{1}{4}$ NW $\frac{1}{4}$), Section 4, T. 5 S., R. 9 W., W. M., River-600 feet South and 1020 feet East; Reservoir-800 feet South and 600 feet East, both from the NW Corner, Section 4

The amount of water used for irrigation, together with the amount secured under any other right existing for the same lands, shall be limited to ----- of one cubic foot per second per acre,

and shall conform to such reasonable rotation system as may be ordered by the proper state officer.


A description of the place of use under the right hereby confirmed, and to which such right is appurtenant, is as follows:

Lot 4 (NW $\frac{1}{4}$ NW $\frac{1}{4}$)
Section 4
T. 5 S., R. 9 W., W. M.

The right to the use of the water for the purposes aforesaid is restricted to the lands or place of use herein described and is subject to the existing minimum flow policies established by the Water Policy Review Board.
