CERTIFICATE OF WATER RIGHT

This Is to Certify, That GEORGE W. COBLE

of New Bridge, State of Oregon, has
a right to the use of the waters of
Eagle Creek

a tributary of Powder River for the purpose of
irrigation of 6.1 acres

and that said right has been confirmed by decree of the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for
Baker County, and the said decree entered of record at Salem, in the Order Record of
the WATER RESOURCES DIRECTOR, in Volume 6, at page 291; that the priority of the right
thereby confirmed dates from 1884;

that the amount of water to which such right is entitled, for the purposes aforesaid, is limited to an
amount actually beneficially used for said purposes, and shall not exceed 1/40 cubic foot per
second per acre.

The point of diversion is located in the NW $\frac{1}{4}$ SW $\frac{1}{4}$, Section 3, T. 9 S., R. 45 E., W.M.;
Holstine Ditch - 2060 feet North and 610 feet East from SW Corner, Section 3.

A description of the place of use under the right, and to which such right is appurtenant, is as
follows:

6.1 acres SE $\frac{1}{4}$ NW $\frac{1}{4}$
Section 10
T. 9 S., R. 45 E., W.M.


This certificate describes that portion of the water right confirmed by the prior
certificate recorded at page 4621, Volume 5, State Record of Water Right
Certificates, NOT modified by the provisions of an order of the Water Resources
Director entered on May 22, 1980, approving transfer application No. 4406.

The issuance of this superseding certificate does not confirm the status of the
water right in reference to ORS 540.610.

And said right shall be subject to all other conditions and limitations contained in said decree.
The right to the use of the water for the purposes aforesaid is restricted to the lands or place of use herein
described.
