CERTIFICATE OF WATER RIGHT

This is to Certify, That THOMAS ROACH

of Weeberby, State of Oregon has a right to the use of
 the waters of Sisley Creek, a tributary of Burnt River;
 for the purpose of Irrigation

and that said right has been confirmed by decree of the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for
 Baker County, and the said decree entered of record at Salem, in the Order
 Record of the STATE ENGINEER, in Volume 8, at page 134; that the priority
 of the right thereby confirmed dates from 1865 for Tract #1; 1882 for Tract #2;

that the amount of water to which such right is entitled, for the purposes aforesaid, is limited to an
 amount actually beneficially used for said purposes, and shall not exceed Three acre feet
 per acre during any irrigation season (with the further limitations contained in
 Paragraph 64 of said decree);

A description of the lands irrigated under such right, and to which the water is appurtenant
 (or, if for other purposes, the place where such water is put to beneficial use), is as follows:

Tract #1:

One (1) acre in the Southeast Quarter of the Southeast Quarter (SE $\frac{1}{4}$ SE $\frac{1}{4}$),
 Section Nineteen (19), Township Twelve (12) South, Range Forty-four (44)
 East of the Willamette Meridian,

(NOTE: Subject and subsequent to right of C. H. Metzker to 15.5 inches
 of water.)

(NOTE: By stipulation claimant is to receive 1.5 miner's inches under
 1885 right and 3 miner's inches for 1882 right, Finding 29, page
 18.)

Tract #2:

Four (4) acres in the Northwest Quarter of the Northeast Quarter (NW $\frac{1}{4}$ NE $\frac{1}{4}$),
 Section Thirty (30), Township Twelve (12) South, Range Forty-four (44)
 East of the Willamette Meridian.

And said right shall be subject to all other conditions and limitations con-
 tained in said decree.
 The right to the use of the water for irrigation purposes is restricted to the lands or place
 of use herein described.
