## CERTIFICATE OF WATER RIGHT

THIS CERTIFICATE ISSUED TO

BOB SHUMAKER 36500 GILKEY ROAD SCIO, OREGON 97374

confirms the right to use the waters of SOUTH SANTIAM RIVER, a tributary of SANTIAM RIVER, for the purpose of IRRIGATING 17.7 ACRES AND COOLING WATER FOR USE IN A MINT STILL.

The right has been perfected under Permit 45024. The date of priority is APRIL 8, 1980. The right is limited to not more than 0.89 CUBIC FOOT PER SECOND; BEING 0.22 CFS FOR IRRIGATION AND 0.67 CFS FOR THE MINT STILL, or its equivalent in case of rotation, measured at the point of diversion from the source.

The point of diversion is located as follows:

LOT 4 (SW 1/4 SW 1/4), SECTION 3, T 11 S, R 2 W, W.M.; 420 FEET NORTH AND 420 FEET EAST FROM SW CORNER SECTION 3.

The amount of water used for irrigation, together with the amount secured under any other right existing for the same lands, shall be limited to ONE-EIGHTIETH of one cubic foot per second per acre, or its equivalent for each acre irrigated and shall be further limited to a diversion of not to exceed 2.5 acre-feet per acre for each acre irrigated during the irrigation season of each year.

The right shall conform to such reasonable rotation system as may be ordered by the proper state officer.

A description of the place of use under the right, and to which such right is appurtenant, is as follows:

NW 1/4 SW 1/4 10.4 ACRES
SW 1/4 SW 1/4 7.3 ACRES
BOTH AS PROJECTED WITHIN DLC 77
LOT 4 (SW 1/4 SW 1/4) MINT STILL
SECTION 3
TOWNSHIP 11 SOUTH, RANGE 2 WEST, W.M.

The right to the use of the water for the above purpose is restricted to beneficial use on the lands or place of use described. The right is subject to minimum flows established by the Water Resources Commission with an effective date prior to this right.
