CERTIFICATE OF WATER RIGHT

confirms the right to use the waters of WASTE WATER or DRAINAGE FROM DITCHES AND WELLS, tributary of the Little Walla Walla River for SUPPLEMENTAL IRRIGATION on 12.5 ACRES.

This right was perfected under Permit S-6849. The priority date is 7/23/1925. The amount of water to which this right is entitled is limited to an amount actually used beneficially and shall not exceed 0.15 cubic foot per second.

The amount of water used for irrigation, together with the amount secured under any other right existing for the same lands, is limited to ONE-EIGHTIETH (1/80) of one cubic foot per second per acre, or its equivalent in case or rotation. The use shall conform to such reasonable rotation system as may be ordered by the proper state official.

A description of the place of use to which this right is appurtenant is as follows:

The right to the use of water for the above purpose is restricted to beneficial use on the lands or place of use described.

This certificate describes the water right confirmed by Certificate 7510, State Record of Water Right Certificates, NOT modified by the provisions of an order of the Water Resources Director entered MAY - 5 2017, approving a petition by Walla Walla River Irrigation District under ORS 541.329 for mapping water rights within a district. This certificate supersedes Certificate 7510.

The issuance of this superseding certificate does not confirm the status of the water right in regard to the provisions of ORS 540.610 pertaining to forfeiture or abandonment.
