NOW BEFORE THE Board of Commissioners sitting for the transaction of County business on the 24th day of April, 2020 is the matter of declaring a local drought emergency in Coos County;

WHEREAS, Coos County has received below normal rainfall for this water year, and only one third of normal rainfall for the month of March, 2020;

WHEREAS, due to the lack of winter rainfall, Coos County is considered to be in D2 (Severe Drought) status as of April 14th, many domestic water wells have gone dry and have not recovered sufficiently to date;

WHEREAS, due to this lack of rainfall, the stream flow rates are near record lows, averaging less than 25% of normal, and there is little chance of recovery;

WHEREAS, local agricultural interests rely exclusively on stream flow water for irrigation as opposed to reservoir storage;

WHEREAS, the weather predictions for the rest of the year do not demonstrate the potential for recovery with above normal temperatures and below normal precipitation predicted for the summer season;

WHEREAS, the above conditions will result in severe economic hardship to Coos

County, including shortages of livestock forage, smaller than average hay crops, loss of
agricultural interests, severe impact to domestic water wells, and increased chance of wildfires;

WHEREAS; Coos County does not have adequate resources to respond to these threats; WHEREAS, the Coos County Board of Commissioners has determined that extraordinary measures must be taken to protect or mitigate economic and agricultural loss and to be responsive to the threat of wildfires.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED that a local drought emergency is declared within Coos County;

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED, that the appropriate response is beyond the capability of Coos County and a local emergency is declared for the purpose of assessment, evaluation and acquiring the ability to provide appropriate available resources;

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Board of Commissioners hereby requests that the Honorable Kate Brown, Governor of Oregon, declare that a State of Drought Emergency exists for all of Coos County under the provision of ORS 536 due to severe and continuing drought conditions beginning at this time and continuing until March 31, 2021;

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Board of Commissioners hereby requests that the Honorable Kate Brown, Governor of Oregon, direct the U.S Secretary of Agriculture to issue a Disaster Declaration for Coos County.

Dear Governor Brown:

The Coos County Board of Commissioners requests approval of the attached Drought Declaration for all of Coos County under the provision of ORS 536.740 as a direct result of severe lack of rainfall, to begin immediately and continue until March 31, 2021.

To date, Coos County has received only two-thirds of normal rainfall water this year. As a result, stream flow rates are near record lows, resulting in less than 25% of average for this time of year, and there is little chance of recovery. This poses a severe threat to the local economy as our local agricultural interests depend exclusively on stream flow water for irrigation as opposed to reservoir storage. Further, estimated projections for precipitation for the rest of the year do not demonstrate a potential for recovery. Long term weather forecasts call for higher than normal temperatures and below normal precipitation for the summer season. Our preliminary assessment of damage predicts severe economic damage, loss of agricultural interests, dramatic impact to domestic water wells, and a significantly heightened threat for wildfires.

As a result of the severity and magnitude of these threats, the Coos County Board of Commissioners has determined that the proper and effective response is beyond the capabilities of the County. Supplementary State and Federal assistance is needed. We extend in advance our appreciation for your consideration on this matter.

Mr. Stahr and Mr. Marheine:

Coos County, by and through its County Elected Officials, requests that the Governor of Oregon issue an executive order for all of Coos County under the provisions of ORS 536 as a direct result of severe and continuing drought conditions.

There is the potential for the Coos County agricultural and livestock, natural resources, recreational, tourism, and related economies to experience widespread and severe damage resulting from extreme weather conditions within the county. Local agriculture and livestock interests rely solely on streamflow water for irrigation, as opposed to reservoir storage. As Coos County is currently considered to be in severe drought conditions, and as Coos County currently has about 25% of average recorded streamflow, with <50% expected rainfall, the conditions will result in severe economic hardships, including shortages to Coos County.

The county has already formally declared a drought, and has attached a copy of the adopted resolution for your files.

The Coos County Board of Commissioners has determined that additional action by and support from the state is needed. This may include assistance from the Oregon Water Resources Department and other Oregon executive branch agencies, operating within their statutory authorities.

Coos County Board of Commissioners therefore requests an executive order from the Governor, declaring drought in Oregon County.

We extend in advance our appreciation for your consideration on this matter.
