O R D E R  
 SUSPENDING ACTION

On November 28, 1941, the United States National Park Service through its agent, Mr. E. P. Leavitt, the superintendent of Crater Lake National Park, filed Applications No. 19574 to No. 19581, inclusive, for permits to use water from a number of springs and streams in Crater Lake National Park for municipal purposes.

These applications were approved January 30, 1942, by issuance of Permits No. 15156 to No. 15163, inclusive.


On November 13, 1942, reports of beginning of construction indicating due diligence in the prosecution of work under all of the above-numbered permits, were received by the State Engineer.

These reports were transmitted by a letter from Mr. Leavitt, setting forth that the present national emergency seriously curtails the use of water as contemplated under the permits in question and that no further funds nor equipment will be available to the Park Service during the war and for an indeterminate period thereafter and requesting that the usual requirements as to the submitting of reports of progress under the filings involved, be waived for the duration of the emergency.

Upon consideration of the foregoing facts and the further fact that diligence has been shown by the permittee in the preparing and submitting of comprehensive reports, maps and data in connection with the permits in question, and that the water involved is for the use of the public,

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that action under Permits No. 15156 to No. 15163, inclusive, in the name of The United States of America, be suspended until such time hereafter as general conditions have reached a stage permitting the resumption of work under these permits and it is further ordered that the permits remain in good standing during the interim.
