O R D E R

On September 12, 1979, Sherman R. and Pansey P. Allen submitted an affidavit that they are the owners of a certain water right and the lands to which the water right is appurtenant; that they have abandoned any and all interest in and to the said water right and request the same be canceled.

The water right in question was established by Decree of Circuit Court for Baker County, entered March 18, 1918, in the Matter of the Determination of the Relative Rights of the Use of the Waters of Powder River, tabulated in the name of G. F. Gardner, at Page 387, Volume 6, Order record of the Water Resources Director, and is a portion of the right described by the certificate recorded at Page 4162, Volume 5, State Record of Water Right Certificates, in the name of G. F. Gardner, and is for the use of not to exceed 1/40 cubic foot per second per acre of water from Washington Gulch, with a date of priority of 1896, for the irrigation of 10.2 acres in the S $\frac{1}{2}$ NE $\frac{1}{4}$ NE $\frac{1}{4}$, Section 15, Township 9 South, Range 39 East, W.M.

ORS 540.621 provides that: "Whatever the owner of a perfected and developed water right certifies under oath to the Water Resources Director that the water right has been abandoned by him and that he desires cancellation thereof, the Water Resources Director shall enter an order canceling the water right."

NOW, THEREFORE, it is hereby ORDERED that the said water right, being a portion of the right described by the certificate recorded at Page 4162, Volume 5, State Record of Water Right Certificates, is canceled.

It is FURTHER ORDERED that the said certificate of water right is canceled, and in lieu thereof a new certificate be issued to describe the balance of the water right NOT involved in the proceeding.
