CASE PROCEEDING

FINAL ORDER DISMISSING CONTESTED

VIRGIL and ANN SHARP, Proponents.

TO: VIRGIL and ANN SHARP

The Water Resources Department (Department) received an affidavit from Virgil and Ann Sharp (proponents), the owners of lands identified in water right Certificate 50650, stating that the water right appurtenant to their lands had been abandoned and requesting voluntary cancellation of the water rights.

The Department notified proponents that a hearing would be held on their proposed cancellation. The contested case hearing on this matter has been held in abeyance pending settlement in a related circuit court matter involving the proponents and the Grants Pass Irrigation District. Pursuant to a stipulated settlement agreement signed by the parties to the circuit court matter and entered in the circuit court in April 2001, the proponents withdrew their voluntary cancellation affidavits.

Consistent with the withdrawal of the affidavits, the Department concludes that cancellation of a portion of the water right evidenced by water right Certificate 50650, as identified in proponents' cancellation affidavit, is not warranted and no hearing is required.

## **ORDER**

It is therefore ordered that this contested case proceeding on the cancellation of a portion water right Certificate 50650 is dismissed.
