is hereby issued a permit to construct TWO RESERVOIRS and store waters from JENNIE'S CREEK IN RESERVOIR 1 & CHARLIE'S CREEK IN RESERVOIR 2, tributaries of WEST FORK DAIRY CREEK, to be appropriated under APPLICATION 69112, PERMIT 50259 for IRRIGATION.

The permit to store these waters is granted under Application R-69111 with a date of priority of MAY 27, 1987. The amount of water entitled to be stored each year under such right, for the purposes aforesaid, shall not exceed 9.0 ACRE-FEET, BEING 2.0 AF IN RESERVOIR 1 AND 7.0 AF IN RESERVOIR 2.

The dam will be located in the:

RESERVOIR 1 SW 1/4 SW 1/4, Section 19, T 2 N, R 3 W, WM;

The maximum height will be 6.00 feet above the stream bed or ground surface at the centerline. The top width will be 15.0 feet, slope of upstream face 3:1, slope of downstream face 2:1, and height of dam above water line when full 1.0 foot. The area submerged by the reservoir, when full, will be 0.25 acre and the maximum depth of water will be 9.0 feet.

RESERVOIR 2 SW 1/4 SW 1/4, Section 19, T 2 N, R 3 W, WM;

Reservoir 2 is entirely excavated. The area submerged by the reservoir, when full, will be 1.25 acres and the maximum depth will be 9.0 feet.

Actual construction work shall begin on or before August 29, 1989, and shall be completed on or before October 1, 1990.

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This permit is for the beneficial use of water. By law, the land use associated with this water use must be in compliance with statewide land-use goals and any local acknowledged land-use plan. It is possible that the land use you propose may not be allowed if it is not in keeping with the goals and the acknowledged plan. Your city or county planning agency can advise you about the land-use plan in your area.
