PERMIT to CONSTRUCT a RESERVOIR and to STORE for BENEFICIAL USE the PUBLIC WATERS

This is to certify that I have examined APPLICATION R-64930 and do hereby grant the same SUBJECT TO EXISTING RIGHTS AND THE FOLLOWING LIMITATIONS AND CONDITIONS:

This permit is issued to United States, Winema National Forest of PO Box 1390, Klamath Falls, Oregon 97601, phone 883-6714, for the construction of Upper Dillon Pond Reservoir and storage of water from an unnamed intermittent stream, a tributary of Jack Creek, for livestock, and is subject to the installation and maintenance of an outlet pipe, or to provide other means to evacuate the stored water when determined* The dam will be LOCATED in the: NW 1/4 NW 1/4 of Section 23, Township 29 South, Range 11 East, WM, in the County of Klamath.

The maximum height will be 4.0 feet feet above the stream bed or ground surface at the centerline. The top width will be 8.0 feet , slope of upstream face 3:1 , slope of downstream face 2:1 , and height of dam above water line when full 2.0 feet

The area submerged by the reservoir, when full, will be 0.07 acre , and the maximum depth of water will be 2.0 feet

* by the Water Resources Director to be necessary to satisfy prior downstream rights.

The location and dimensions of the spillway are: Around the dam, the bottom width of the spillway will be 10.0 feet. The distance between the crest of the dam and the crest of the spillway will be 2.0 feet.

The location and dimension of the outlet conduit will be: None.

The structure is in the channel.

The dam will be earthfill construction.

The right hereunder shall be limited to the storage of 0.1 acre-foot

The PRIORITY DATE of this permit is March 18, 1983

Actual construction work shall begin on or before August 14, 1985, and shall thereafter be prosecuted with reasonable diligence and be completed on or before October 1, 19, 85.
