PERMIT TO APPROPRIATE THE PUBLIC WATERS

This is to certify that I have examined APPLICATION and do hereby grant the same SUBJECT TO EXISTING RIGHTS INCLUDING THE APPROPRIATE MINIMUM FLOW POLICIES ESTABLISHED BY THE WATER POLICY REVIEW BOARD and the following limitations and conditions:

This permit is issued to **USDA Forest Service - Malheur National Forest, 139 Northeast Dayton Street, John Day, Oregon 97845, phone 575-1731, for the use of the waters of SW-39 Pine Tree Spring,**

for the PURPOSE of **livestock watering**

that the PRIORITY OF THE RIGHT dates from **August 3, 1981**

and is limited to the amount of water which can be applied to beneficial use and shall not exceed **0.5 gpm.**

The POINT OF DIVERSION is to be LOCATED: **400 feet South and 2,000 feet East from the Northwest Corner of Section 18, being within NE 1/4 of the NW 1/4 of Section 18, Township 16 South, Range 36 East, WM, in the County of Grant.**

A description of the PLACE OF USE under the permit, and to which such right is appurtenant, is as follows:

Township 16 South, Range 36 East, WM Section 18 NE 1/4 NW 1/4

April 19, 1984

Actual construction work shall begin on or before **85**, and shall thereafter be prosecuted with reasonable diligence and be completed on or before October 1, 19

Complete application of the water to the proposed use shall be made on or before October 1, 19 **86**.
