PERMIT TO APPROPRIATE THE PUBLIC WATERS

This is to certify that I have examined APPLICATION 63826 and do hereby grant the same SUBJECT TO EXISTING RIGHTS INCLUDING THE APPROPRIATE MINIMUM FLOW POLICIES ESTABLISHED BY THE WATER POLICY REVIEW BOARD and the following limitations and conditions:

This permit is issued to Gary Dean Nordholm of Route 1, Box 98A, Gaston, Oregon 97119, phone 357-7880, for the use of the waters a spring, tributary of Tualatin River.

for the PURPOSE of domestic use for one family including one-half acre lawn and garden and stock water; being 0.01 cubic foot per second for domestic use and 0.005 cfs for stock water

that the PRIORITY OF THE RIGHT dates from August 5, 1982 for 0.01 cfs and February 11, 1983 for 0.005 cfs

and is limited to the amount of water which can be applied to beneficial use and shall not exceed 0.015 cubic foot per second.

The POINT OF DIVERSION is to be LOCATED 7.5 chains East and 12.0 chains South from the Center of Section 19, being within the NW 1/4 SE 1/4 of Section 19, Township 1 South, Range 3 West, WM, in the County of Washington.

A description of the PLACE OF USE under the permit, and to which such right is appurtenant, is as follows:

Township 1 South, Range 3 West, WM Section 19 NE 1/4 SW 1/4 stock
NE 1/4 SW 1/4 domestic

Actual construction work shall begin on or before April 29, 1984, and shall thereafter be prosecuted with reasonable diligence and be completed on or before October 1, 1985.

Complete application of the water to the proposed use shall be made on or before October 1, 1986.
