PERMIT TO APPROPRIATE THE PUBLIC WATERS

This is to certify that I have examined APPLICATION **66704** and do hereby grant the same SUBJECT TO EXISTING RIGHTS INCLUDING THE APPROPRIATE MINIMUM FLOW POLICIES ESTABLISHED BY THE WATER POLICY REVIEW BOARD and the following limitations and conditions:

This permit is issued to **USDI, Bureau of Land Management of 3040 Biddle Road, Medford, Oregon 97504, phone 776-4174, for the use of the waters of Burnt Creek and reservoir, to be constructed under Application R-66703, Permit R-9253, for the PURPOSE of livestock and wildlife**

that the PRIORITY OF THE RIGHT dates from **September 23, 1983,**

and is limited to the amount of water which can be applied to beneficial use and shall not exceed **0.001 cubic foot per second**

The POINT OF DIVERSION is to be LOCATED: **2600 feet North and 2700 feet West from the SE Corner of Section 17, being within the NE 1/4 SW 1/4 of Section 17, Township 39 South, Range 3 East, WM, in the County of Jackson.**

A description of the PLACE OF USE under the permit, and to which such right is appurtenant, is as follows:

Township 39 South, Range 3 East, WM Section 17 NE 1/4 SW 1/4 livestock & wildlife

Actual construction work shall begin on or before **February 13, 1985**, and shall thereafter be prosecuted with reasonable diligence and be completed on or before October 1, 19**85**.

Complete application of the water to the proposed use shall be made on or before October 1, 19**86**.
