PERMIT TO APPROPRIATE THE PUBLIC WATERS

This is to certify that I have examined APPLICATION 67421 and do hereby grant the same SUBJECT TO EXISTING RIGHTS INCLUDING THE APPROPRIATE MINIMUM FLOW POLICIES ESTABLISHED BY THE WATER POLICY REVIEW BOARD and the following limitations and conditions:

for the PURPOSE of domestic use for one family including the irrigation of not to exceed one-half acre lawn and noncommercial garden

that the PRIORITY OF THE RIGHT dates from October 7, 1983

foot and is limited to the amount of water which can be applied to beneficial use and shall not exceed 0.01per second of water

The POINT OF DIVERSION is to be LOCATED: 1044.92 feet North and 2087.36 feet West from the E 1/4 Corner of Section 32, being within the SW 1/4 NE 1/4 of Section 32, Township 13 South, Range 10 West, WM, in the County of Lincoln.

A description of the PLACE OF USE under the permit, and to which such right is appurtenant, is as follows:

Township 13 South, Range 10 West, WM Section 32 Lot 9 Domestic use for one family including the irrigation of not to exceed one-half acre lawn and noncommercial garden

Actual construction work shall begin on or before March 16, 1985 reasonable diligence and be completed on or before October 1, 19 $^{\,\,85}$.

Complete application of the water to the proposed use shall be made on or before October 1, 19 86 .
