## PERMIT TO APPROPRIATE THE PUBLIC WATERS

This is to certify that I have examined APPLICATION 68142 and do hereby grant the same SUBJECT TO EXISTING RIGHTS INCLUDING THE APPROPRIATE MINIMUM FLOW POLICIES ESTABLISHED BY THE WATER POLICY REVIEW BOARD and the following limitations and conditions:

This permit is issued to Richard Caddock of 1606 Wild River Drive, Roseburg, Oregon 97470, for the use of the waters of an unnamed intermittent stream, a tributary of North Umpqua River,

Umpqua River, for the PURPOSE of maintenance of Caddock Recreation Reservoir to be constructed under Application R-68097, Permit R-9972, for recreation (largemouth Bass fishery)

that the PRIORITY OF THE RIGHT dates from August 2, 1984

and is limited to the amount of water which can be applied to beneficial use and shall not exceed 0.02 cubic foot per second

The POINT OF DIVERSION is to be LOCATED: 1821 feet North and 458 feet West from the Southeast Corner of Section 15, being within the NE 1/4 SE 1/4 of Section 15, Township 26 South, Range 4 West, WM, in the County of Douglas.

A description of the PLACE OF USE under the permit, and to which such right is appurtenant, is as follows:

Township 26 South, Range 4 West, WM Section 15 NE 1/4 SE 1/4 Recreational

Actual construction work shall begin on or before September 27, 1985 and shall thereafter be prosecuted with reasonable diligence and be completed on or before October 1, 19 86.

Complete application of the water to the proposed use shall be made on or before October 1, 19 87 .
