## PERMIT TO APPROPRIATE THE PUBLIC WATERS

This is to certify that I have examined APPLICATION 52893 and do hereby grant the same SUBJECT TO EXISTING RIGHTS INCLUDING THE APPROPRIATE MINIMUM FLOW POLICIES ESTABLISHED BY THE WATER POLICY REVIEW BOARD and the following limitations and conditions:

This permit is issued to USDA Forest Service - Malheur National Forest of 139 NE Dayton Street, John Day, Oregon 97845, phone 575-1731, for the use of the waters of CCC Spring (SW-7), a tributary of Cross Hollow Creek, for the PURPOSE of stockwater

that the PRIORITY OF THE RIGHT dates from September 24, 1981

and is limited to the amount of water which can be applied to beneficial use and shall not exceed 0.005 cubic foot per second

The POINT OF DIVERSION is to be LOCATED: 2150 feet North and 1850 feet East from the Section Corner of Sections 5, 6, 7 and 8, being within the NE 1/4 SW 1/4 of Section 5, Township 10 South, Range 32 East, WM, in the County of Grant.

A description of the PLACE OF USE under the permit, and to which such right is appurtenant, is as follows:

Township 10 South, Range 32 East, WM Section 5 NE 1/4 SW 1/4 Stock water

Actual construction work shall begin on or before December 28, 1985 and shall thereafter be prosecuted with reasonable diligence and be completed on or before October 1, 19 86.

Complete application of the water to the proposed use shall be made on or before October 1, 19 87.
