PERMIT TO APPROPRIATE THE PUBLIC WATERS

This is to certify that I have examined APPLICATION 68307 and do hereby grant the same SUBJECT TO EXISTING RIGHTS INCLUDING THE APPROPRIATE MINIMUM FLOW POLICIES ESTABLISHED BY THE WATER POLICY REVIEW BOARD and the following limitations and conditions:

This permit is issued to Lauren J. Jacobsen and Aaron D. Jacobsen of Elsie Route, Box 658, Seaside, Oregon 97138, phone 755-2428, for the use of the waters of Northrup Creek, a tributary of South Fork Nehalem River, for the PURPOSE of domestic use for one family including the irrigation of not to exceed one-half acre lawn and noncommercial garden

that the PRIORITY OF THE RIGHT dates from April 12, 1985

and is limited to the amount of water which can be applied to beneficial use and shall not exceed 0.01 cfs

The POINT OF DIVERSION is to be LOCATED: 450 feet North and 637 feet East from the Southwest Corner of the SE 1/4 SE 1/4 of the SE 1/4 SE 1/4 of Section 21, being within SE 1/4 SE 1/4 of Section 21, Township 6 North, Range 6 West, WM, in the County of Clatsop.

A description of the PLACE OF USE under the permit, and to which such right is appurtenant, is as follows:

Township 6 North, Range 6 West, WM Section 21 SW 1/4 SE 1/4 Domestic use for one family including the irrigation of not to exceed one-half acre lawn and non-commercial garden

Actual construction work shall begin on or before May 13, 1986, and shall thereafter be prosecuted with reasonable diligence and be completed on or before October 1, 1986

Complete application of the water to the proposed use shall be made on or before October 1, 1987
