## PERMIT TO APPROPRIATE THE PUBLIC WATERS

This is to certify that I have examined APPLICATION **66013** and do hereby grant the same SUBJECT TO EXISTING RIGHTS INCLUDING THE APPROPRIATE MINIMUM FLOW POLICIES ESTABLISHED BY THE WATER POLICY REVIEW BOARD and the following limitations and conditions:

This permit is issued to **USDI, National Park Service, John Day Fossil Beds National Monument, John Day, Oregon 97845, phone 575-0721,** for the use of the waters of **Bridge Creek, a tributary of the John Day River,** for the PURPOSE of **irrigation of 2.0 acres**

that the PRIORITY OF THE RIGHT dates from **August 12, 1985**

and is limited to the amount of water which can be applied to beneficial use and shall not exceed **0.05 cfs**

The POINT OF DIVERSION is to be LOCATED: **1660 feet North and 3150 feet East from the Southwest Corner of Section 31, being within the NW 1/4 SE 1/4 of Section 31, Township 10 South, Range 21 East, WM.**

A description of the PLACE OF USE under the permit, and to which such right is appurtenant, is as follows:

**Township 10 South, Range 21 East, WM Section 31 NW 1/4 SE 1/4 1.8 acres  
SW 1/4 SE 1/4 0.2 acre**

The AMOUNT OF WATER used for irrigation, together with the amount secured under any other right existing for the same lands shall be limited to 1/40 of one cubic foot per second per acre, and shall be further limited to a diversion of not to exceed 4.0 acre-feet per acre for each acre irrigated during the irrigation season of each year, and shall conform to such reasonable rotation system as may be ordered by the proper state officer.

Actual construction work shall begin on or before **December 16, 1986** and shall thereafter be prosecuted with reasonable diligence and be completed on or before October 1, 19 **87**

Complete application of the water to the proposed use shall be made on or before October 1, 19 **88**
