## PERMIT TO APPROPRIATE THE PUBLIC WATERS

This is to certify that I have examined APPLICATION **68681** and do hereby grant the same SUBJECT TO EXISTING RIGHTS INCLUDING THE APPROPRIATE MINIMUM FLOW POLICIES ESTABLISHED BY THE WATER POLICY REVIEW BOARD and the following limitations and conditions:

This permit is issued to Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife of 506 SW Mill, Portland, Oregon 97201, phone 229-5701, for the use of the waters of South Fork Coos River, a tributary of Coos River, for the PURPOSE of spawning and raising striped bass/hybrid bass

that the PRIORITY OF THE RIGHT dates from March 6, 1986

and is limited to the amount of water which can be applied to beneficial use and shall not exceed 1.0 cubic foot per second

The POINT OF DIVERSION is to be LOCATED: 15 feet South and 245 feet West from the Southeast corner of NE 1/4 of the NE 1/4 of Section 35, being within the SE 1/4 NE 1/4 Section 35, Township 25 South, Range 12 West, WM, in the County of Coos.

A description of the PLACE OF USE under the permit, and to which such right is appurtenant, is as follows:

Township 25 South, Range 12 West, WM Section 35 NE 1/4 NE 1/4 Spawning and raising Striped Bass/Hybrid Bass

Actual construction work shall begin on or before July 3, 1987, and shall thereafter be prosecuted with reasonable diligence and be completed on or before October 1, 1988 Extended to October 1, 1990

Complete application of the water to the proposed use shall be made on or before October 1, 1989 Extended to October 1, 1990
