PERMIT TO APPROPRIATE THE PUBLIC WATERS

are hereby issued a permit to use the waters from TUALATIN RIVER, A TRIBUTARY OF WILLAMETTE RIVER, for STOCK WATER. The permit to the use of these waters has been issued under Application 69802 with a date of priority of JANUARY 11, 1989 for use of 12,000 gallons per day and JULY 7, 1989 for use of 3,000 gallons per day. The permit is limited to not more than 15,000 GALLONS PER DAY FOR STOCK, or its equivalent in case of rotation, measured at the point of diversion.

The points of diversion are located as follows:

SW 1/4 SE 1/4, SECTION 32, T 1 S, R 4 W, WM;
880 FEET NORTH and 2085 FEET WEST from SE CORNER, Sec 32.

NE 1/4 SW 1/4, SECTION 32, T 1 S, R 4 W, WM;
1570 FEET NORTH and 2415 FEET EAST from SW CORNER, Sec 32.

NE 1/4 SE 1/4, SECTION 32, T.1 S, R 4 W, WM;
1435 FEET NORTH and 850 FEET WEST from SE CORNER, Sec 32.

The use of water allowed under this permit shall conform to such reasonable rotation system as may be ordered by the proper state officer.

The place of use is as follows:

1/4 1/4	SECTION	TOWNSHIP	RANGE, WM
NE SE	32	1 S	4 W
SW SE	32	1 S	4 W
SE SW	32	1 S	4 W

Actual construction work shall begin on or before July 14, 1990, and shall be completed on or before October 1, 1991. Complete application of the water to the use shall be made on or before October 1, 1992.

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This permit is for the beneficial use of water. By law, the land use associated with this water use must be in compliance with statewide land-use goals and any local acknowledged land-use plan. It is possible that the land use you propose may not be allowed if it is not in keeping with the goals and the acknowledged plan. Your city or county planning agency can advise you about the land-use plan in your area.

The right is subject to minimum flows established by the Water Resources Commission with an effective date prior to this right.
