Please find enclosed the Preliminary Determination indicating that, based on the information available, the Department has concluded that approval of the change in points of diversion proposed in T-11972 would result in injury to instream water right Certificate 63251. Consistent with your request that we seek a recommendation from Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife and Oregon Parks and Recreation Department on whether we should consent to the injury to the instream water right, we are proceeding with that process concurrently with issuance of the preliminary determination.

The Water Resources Department holds instream water rights in trust for the benefit of the people of Oregon. Under ORS 540.530(c), we may approve the transfer only if the agency(s) that requested the instream water right concludes that the changes proposed will result in net benefits to the resources protected by the instream water right, and recommends that we consent to the injury of the right. Please contact the agency staff person to whom the agency review letter has been sent, to discuss whether you may be able to assist in providing information needed for the analysis.

After we have received a recommendation both the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife (ODFW) and Oregon Parks and Recreation Department (OPRD) on whether to consent to the injury, provided no protests have been filed, we will issue an order either:

- Approving the transfer with conditions, if any, identified in the agency recommendations as necessary to ensure that the change will result in net benefits, or
- Reaffirming our decision that the instream water right would be injured and denying the transfer.

The timing for issuance of the order will depend on the availability of information needed by ODFW and OPRD to perform the net benefits analysis upon which their recommendations must be based, and the time necessary to allow public review and comment on the recommendations. You are not authorized to use water from the proposed points of diversion pending a final decision by the Department on your transfer application.

A public notice is being published in the Department's weekly publication and in the Blue Mountain Eagle newspaper, simultaneously with issuance of the Preliminary Determination. The notice initiates a period in which any person may file either a protest opposing the decision proposed by the Department in the Preliminary Determination or a standing statement supporting the Department's decision. The protest period will end 30 days after the last date of newspaper publication.

If no protest is filed, the Department will issue a Final Order consistent with the Preliminary Determination. You should receive a copy of the Final Order about 30 days after the close of the protest period.

If a protest is filed, the application may be referred to a contested case proceeding. A contested case provides an opportunity for the proponents and opponents of the decision proposed in the Preliminary Determination to present information and arguments supporting their position in a quasi-judicial proceeding.

Authority

Oregon Revised Statutes (ORS) 540.505 to 540.580 establish the process in which a water right holder may submit a request to transfer the point of diversion, place of use, or character of use authorized under an existing water right. Oregon Administrative Rules (OAR) Chapter 690, Division 380 implements the statutes and provides the Department's procedures and criteria for evaluating transfer applications.

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Findings of Fact

- 1. On January 23, 2015, Raphael and Sandra Davis, Harold and Dixie Reynolds, Robert Cox and Stacy Robinson-Cox filed an application to change the points of diversion under Certificate 36598. The Department assigned the application number T-11972.
- 2. On September 25, 2015, the applicant amended the application and map to better clarify the proposed point of diversion and updated the Land Use forms.
- 3. Notice of the application for transfer was published on February 3, 2015, pursuant to OAR 690-380-4000. The Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife filed a response to the notice, stating that moving a proposed point of diversion upstream on Cottonwood Creek would injure instream water right Certificate 63251. The Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife also determined that a fish screen is necessary at the new points of diversion to prevent fish from entering the diversion and that the diversion is currently equipped with an appropriate fish screen.

Pursuant to OAR 690-380-4030, any person may file a protest or standing statement within 30 days after the last date of publication of notice of this preliminary determination.

- On December 31, 2015, the Department sent a copy of the draft Preliminary Determination proposing to deny Transfer Application T-11772 to the applicants. The draft Preliminary Determination cover letter set forth a deadline of January 31, 2016, for the applicants to respond. The agent for the applicants requested the Department proceed with issuance of a Preliminary Determination and provided the necessary information to demonstrate that the applicants are authorized to pursue the transfer.
- 5. On January 19, 2016, the agent for the applicants requested that the Department seek a recommendation from the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife and Oregon Parks and Recreation Department as to whether the Department should consent to injury of the instream water right pursuant to OAR 690-380-5050.

The amount of water used for irrigation, together with the amount secured under any other right existing for the same lands, is limited to a diversion of ONE-FORTIETH of one cubic foot per second per acre irrigated to June 1 and ONE-EIGHTIETH of one cfs per acre thereafter; further limited to 1.0 acre-foot per calendar month to June 1 and 4.0 acre-feet per acre during the irrigation season from April 1st to September 30th of each year, measured

7. Certificate 36598 describes the locations of the points of diversion for the water uses on Cottonwood Creek per each ditch name. Information is available from the applicant's Certified Water Rights Examiner (Bagett/2014) current map based on a recent field visit and subsequent survey more precisely indicating that the old Carris Ditch (POD#5 on map), old Robertson Ditch (POD#1 on map) and lower McCarty diversion (POD#6 on map) points on Cottonwood Creek are located as follows:

12. Numerous letters of support from Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife (ODFW) staff accompanied this transfer application (Jeff Neal, Fish Biologist, and Kelly Stokes, Program Manager, both of John Day; and Adrienne Averett, Eastside Implementation Coordinator, La Grande). Their letters state that this project has been a priority of ODFW's for decades because it will expand salmonid rearing habitat, screen irrigation diversions and provide for fish passage in the John Day River system. A letter of support was also received from Theresa DeBardelaben, Regional Water Quality Specialist with the Oregon Department of Agriculture, stating that the transfer would both improve and protect water quality. Dirk Renner, Project Biologist for US Fish & Wildlife, also submitted a letter in support of this Cottonwood Creek transfer for providing improved fish passage. Allen Gillette, Fish Biologist for the Confederated Tribes of the Warm Springs Reservation, supports the project because of the aquatic restoration and fish passage benefits which are high priorities in the Tribes' restoration goals. A letter was received from John Dvorsky with Waterways Consulting, Inc. stating that his company assisted the Monument Soil & Water Conversation District with a cost effective engineering design of the fish passage components of the project which would aid in accomplishing project goals. Lastly, Tony Malmberg, Flow Restoration Program Manager of The Freshwater Trust, expressed support for the project and the landowners' considerations of alternative management of the water while providing multiple benefits to the fishery. In conclusion, the proposed project has much support and is focused on restoration efforts in improving fish passage and riparian function at existing irrigation diversion sites.

Transfer Review Criteria [OAR 690-380-4010(2)]

- 13. Water has been used within the last five years prior to submittal of the transfer application according to the terms and conditions of the right. There is no information in the record that would demonstrate that the rights are subject to forfeiture under ORS 540.610.
- 14. Diversion structures and ditches sufficient to use the full amount of water allowed under the existing right were present within the five-year period prior to submittal of Transfer Application T-11972.
- 15. The Watermaster has made a statement that there has not been regulation on Cottonwood Creek due to shortage since the year 2000.

16. The proposed changes would result in injury to an instream water right which exists for the reach of the river in which the authorized points of diversion would be moved upstream, and stream flows within the reach are frequently below the levels allocated under the instream water right. Certificate 63251, the instream water right applied for by the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife and the Oregon Parks and Recreation Department, exists to maintain instream flows for the purpose of anadromous and resident fish habitat and recreational fishing. The following table provides a comparison of monthly streamflows on Cottonwood Creek and the instream water right:

- 17. The proposed changes would not result in enlargement of the right.
- 18. Notwithstanding injury to instream water right, the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife has stated that this project may create a net benefit to fish in Cottonwood Creek but reserves its final determination until a more thorough review of the transfer application can be conducted.

Determination and Proposed Action

The change in points of diversion of water as proposed in Transfer Application T-11972 cannot be effected without injury to an existing instream water right. Thus, Transfer Application T-11972 does NOT appear to be consistent with the requirements of ORS 540.505 to 540.580 and OAR 690-380-5000. The transfer application will be denied unless the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife and Oregon State Parks and Recreation Department recommend that the Department consent to injury of the instream water right, pursuant to OAR 690-380-5050, or protests are filed pursuant to OAR 690-380-4030.

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If the transfer is approved notwithstanding the Department's preliminary determination that the transfer will result in injury, the change and subsequent use of water shall be subject to the following conditions:

- 1. The change in points of diversion proposed in Transfer Application T-11972 is approved.
- 2. The right to the use of the water is restricted to beneficial use at the place of use described and is subject to all other conditions and limitations contained in Certificate 36598, and any related decree.
- 3. The quantity of water diverted at the new points of diversion shall not exceed the quantity of water lawfully available at the original points of diversion.
- 4. Water Right Certificate 36598 is cancelled. A new certificate will be issued describing that portion of the right not affected by this transfer.
- 5. Before water use may begin under this order, the water user shall install a totalizing flow meter, or, with prior approval of the Director, another suitable measuring device, at the new additional point of diversion. The water user shall maintain the meter or measuring devices in good working order. The water user shall allow the Watermaster access to the meter or measuring devices; provided however, where the meter or measuring devices are located within a private structure, the Watermaster shall request access upon reasonable notice.
- 6. Prior to diverting water, the water user shall install a fish screening and/or fish by-pass device, as appropriate, at the new point of diversion consistent with the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife's (ODFW) design and construction standards. Prior to installation, the water user shall obtain written approval from ODFW that the required screen and/or by-pass device meets ODFW's criteria. Prior to submitting a Claim of Beneficial Use, the water user must obtain written approval from ODFW that the required screening and/or by-pass device was installed to the state's criteria. The water user shall maintain and operate the fish screen and/or by-pass device, as appropriate, at the point of diversion consistent with ODFW's operational and maintenance standards.
- 7. The water user shall install and maintain a headgate, an in-line flow meter, weir, or other suitable device for measuring and recording the quantity of water diverted. The type and plans of the headgate and measuring device must be approved by the Department prior to beginning construction and shall be installed under the general supervision of the Department.
- 8. Full beneficial use of the water shall be made, consistent with the terms of this order, on or before **October 1, 2017**. A Claim of Beneficial Use prepared by a Certified Water Right Examiner shall be submitted by the applicant to the Department within one year after the deadline for completion of the changes and full beneficial use of the water.

9.	When satisfactory proof of the completed change is received, a new certificate confirming
