south bank but the loose shale of Shellrock mountain discouraged even the stout-hearted drovers.

Long after the settlement of Hood River and removal of the Indians, the little point now to become a county park was still only a birdseye spot near an incredibly steep trail to the Columbia.

IT IS HARD

to visualize the land along the Columbia river as it was until waters of Bonneville lake rose to a 72-foot level after completion of the dame in 1938.

Thousands of acres of good river-bottom land suitable for farming, long sandbars and great groves of trees were drowned the dam back, only those who remember Morton's farm extensive at Ruthton or Koberg's truck gardens and fine beach east of Hood River know the extent of that drowning.

FIRST IN THE AREA

of the newly acquired park was Arthur Phelps, a cooper by trade who/came to the creek now named for him from the Coscades, after the massacre there in 1856.

Following the creek upstream a mile or so, he started a two-man mill operation making oak kegs in 1858. Shipped to The Dalles, these barrels were filled with whiskey and packed into the gold mining warm camps of central and eastern Oregon.

FIRST WHITE MEN

to file pre-emption claims on the land around present Ruthton Point on the river were A_{mos} Underwood, veteran soldier, and

bank, to the mouth of the White Salmon river.

Marden developed a profitable farm on the rich river-bottom soil. Springs above the bluff gave him irrigation water. The rising of the Columbia each spring kept the lowland on the Columbia rich for # farming.

Marden's farm was solated from the tiny Hood River settlement by the great cliff behind it. To ship produce to The Dalles or Portland, he moved it by small boat to the steamer landing at tak mouth of the Hood river.

INTREPID JOEL PALMER

A WAY UP THE BLUFF

to the Valley took a little better shape when the state of Oregon tried to build a road from The Dalles to Portland in 1876. John Marden, who had moved to The Dalles, was in charge of construction. The road petered out around the Cascades, but it did give Haynes and Sanders a better wagonroad to the Valky from their farm.



III - Relative Location

The Homesite under discussion is located approximately 170 miles from the Pacific Ocean, noted for its beaches, ever gaining in their popularity. It is about 60 miles from Portland, Cregon's City of Roses. The great new Columbia barrier, one of the world's most unique nower and navigation dams, Bonneville Dam, is but 25 miles downstream. Within this dam has been built the world's highest lift in shinlock, 66 feet, to pass craft from world ports. The United States Engineers are now engaged in dredging the Columbia channel, of tidal influence below the dam, and when this project was completed in 1941, enabled ocean going vessesIs to play as far up the Columbia River as The Dalles, Oregon, 200 miles inland, the only seaport of the world set behind two mountain ranges. From the windows of the estate's home, one may see ships from the seven seas passing by:

All the Cascade Mountain area of this district is a playground. Lakes and streams abound with trout; and Salmon and Steelhead are plentiful in the Columbia river practically the year around. The deer and black bear are to be seen in the fall. A short journey to eastern Cregon will take the sportsmen to districts, where annually elk hunting is available. Mountain climbing and camping beside highland lakes and in valleys filled with albine flowers are lures for summer months. During the winter seasons those who care for winter sports have to travel only short distances to ski jumps and natural

tobaggan slides.

NATURAL ISOLATION GIVES PRIVACY

One of the most unique popeals found in this estate is the isolation that has been given it by the barriers of cliff that nature has thrown up. It is actually within a few hundred feet of one of the nation's busiest motor highways, beside an inland waterway. But it sits high above both. The dwellers there can see, but if they chose, cannot be seen.

W HISTORIC BACEROUND

The estate is a part of pne of the first claims filed in this section of Cregon. he original donation lond claim was pre-erroted by the ste Amos Underwood, a noted Indian fighter, in the year 1856, just after the Massacre of the cascades, whither he ad gone with federal soldiers to lift the siege. Six Indias, all chiefs, were hanged

their complicty in this Massacre. One of them, neif Cheroweth, before submitting to the noose, made a notable address and gave his daughter to Underwood, who accented the resposibility and made her his bride.

Underwood before completing his claim, sold his right of equity to John Marden, pioneer trader to The Dalles. The Latter, who won note for his superintendency of construction of The Dalles and Sandy Wagon Roads, a state project, forerunner of the Columbia River Highway, within a few years sold the place at a huge profit to C.J. Havnes, who established the first commercial fruit orchard in Hood River. Haynes, however, grew peaches, which he sold at fabulous prices to miners of the frontiers in this area in their different camps.

Gus Miller, a native of Ohio, owned and did a great amount of improving on the property. He gave it the name of "Wildbrook", a most appropriate name. This name has been officially registered with the Cregon Secretary of State.

Mr. Miller came to Hood River Valley in 1906, lured by prospects of the fruit development there. He had long worked in the contracting business, engaged on reclamstion work for the United States Dept. of Interior in Wyoming and Montana. He Purchased "Wildbrook" in 1919 and moved there in 1920. Mr. Miller was the type of man who has inbred in him a distaste for impermanency of construction. He erected on "Wildbrook", at a most alluring site, one of the most substantial homes of this section of Cregon. He also engaged in much permanent work in the construction of an irragation system and a water system to give an ample domestic supply to his house. Substantial masonry walls have been erected along the top of the Columbia cliff. This work is of a type that blends with the wild, rugged beauty of the natural environs. He engaged in much work in providing for fish ponds and in removing rock formations, where unsightly, and in the ollanting of gardens to enchance natural shrubs and flowers. However, in the main he left the estate as nature has builded it.

It was this that attracted the present owners, Mrs. Donna A. Meredith, and her sons Thomas C., Robert Bruce, and Richard C. They feel that the place lends itself to their individual tastes, and can be improved to a greater extent with some their ideas.


