

8. REMARKS:

The water from the creek does not run freely into the Umpqua River all summer. Pools of water form in the creek during the summer (July - September) in the location of two separate springs within the stream bed. This springs are located approximately 1000 feet upstream from the mouth of the creek and the Umpqua River.

The creek banks are covered with sod such as clover and fescue extending from the field and some blackberry vines. Oak, ash and fir trees line the bank and provide shade and nesting areas for wildlife.

We do not allow the livestock to run freely to the river. All of the river frontage is fenced. The flood plain is left natural. Only the area needed to access the river to install and maintain our irrigation system is mowed within the flood plain.

Enclosed is an application for a Vested Water Right with a priority date of continuous use since June 1, 1880. The supporting documents validate the continuous use of stock water since that date.

The diary belonging to Evan Thompson Woodruff makes statements to give proof that livestock had been kept on this parcel of property until 1910. Evan Woodruff died at that time. His will states that animals were kept on the farm at the time the will was probated in 1927. A notarized statement by Ralph Krohn, grandson of Evan Woodruff, makes an additional statement that livestock was kept on the farm between 1927-1938. Jay E. Young and Katherine Young purchased the farm at that time (1938). Albert L. Young, son of Jay and Katherine, has lived on the farm since 1938. The original Jonathan Woodruff Donation Land Claim included the property described in this application. The Albert L. and Ella Mae Young property is a 42 acre parcel which was part of the Woodruff Donation Land Claim.

We are requesting water rights from the un-named stream because we use this water year round for stock water. The animals are not allowed to pasture over the riverbank. We maintain a fence above the river bank to keep the animals from watering at the river. Our domestic well does not give enough quantity to allow for stock water use all year.

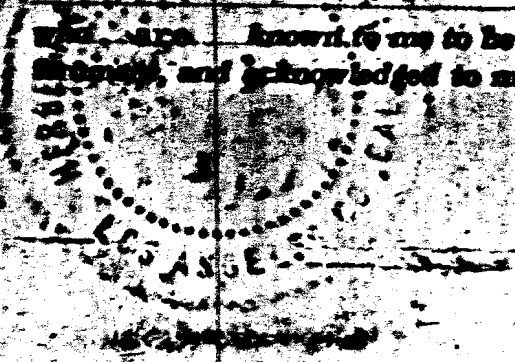

DIARY OF EVAN T. WOODRUFF

The following entrys from the daily diary of Evan Woodruff are copied to prove that horse teams were in use and livestock (goats, cows, colts, sheep and beef cattle) were continually raised on the Woodruff Homestead.

All equipment was pulled or powered by work horses. The Woodruff family traveled to Roseburg, Umpqua Ferry and to Oakland by horse drawn buggy or wagon. They traveled from Oakland via train after 1884.

1880

- June 24th Run mower Raked hay etc. Firing cannon at
 Roseburg to Oakland.
- Aug. 12 Began threshing. Threshed nearly 800 Fine day.
- Sept. 9 Went to Winnifred. Broke the line shaft in the
 evening went to Umpqua Ferry & got it fixed. Fine day.
- Oct. 5 Hauled some rails, etc. Didn't do much. Father
 went to mill.
- Dec. 15 Killed hogs & did sundry work. Raining some.
- Dec. 25th Christmas Came to Cy's roads muddy. Had to
 swim my horse to get to the ferry boat at Roseburg.
 Went to the Christmas tree at Spores School House.
 Rained in evening.

1881

- Jan. 12 Rained until 2 PM hard most of the time. Rained
 all night nearly. River higher than it has been since
 1861. It is all over Garden Bottom and part of the
 Bottom on this side of the river. Did nothing today.
- Jan. 13 River falling fast. It liked three feet of being
 as high as it was in 1861.
- Jan. 14 Rained hard again as high as Wed.
- Feb. 16-17 Hauled wood and cut wood hauled hay. No rain but
 foggy and cloudy all day.
- March 8th Plowed in the fore noon.

1883

- Jan. 3 Cut wood and repaired the stable.
- Jan. 10 Killed hogs.
- May 24 Fine day. Sheep shearers here. S. W. plowed.
(S. W. is Sam Waggoner)
- May 25 Sheep Shearers got done. 165 sheep Fine day
 Taught.
- May 28 Sam Waggoner put his colt in the pasture. Dad
 went to town and got some wool sacks.
- June 6 Hot. Taught Bob, Mort & father hauling lumber.
- June 9 Went to Hubbard Creek for lumber.

1886

- Sept. 22 Brought the team home. Went to Roseburg with a
 load of wheat.
- Sept. 30 Shearing sheep.
- Oct. 20 Killed a hog
- Nov. 1 Got 50 ewe sheep.
- Nov. 15 Plowed with 2 team.
- Dec. 1 Sowed 10 acres with wheat.
- Dec. 2 Harrowed and plowed.
- Dec. 10 & 13 Went to mt top and brought a load of pickets.
 (Woodruff would have taken a team and wagon to mountain
 ranch of Marsters where pickets were cut for fencing.
 These pickets could have been the hand split pickets
 that were used for portable fences.
- Dec. 14 Killed 9 hogs.

- Feb. 15 Got 1180 lbs. wheat (from) Booth. Returned to
 him at Good's Mill 1203 lbs.
- March 4 Plowed, harrowed and sowed oats after noon.

- Aug. 8-31 Threshed for neighbors - Goods, Alderson, Johnson, Bob Woodruff, J. Conns, McKennys, Williams Bros., Landers, Grims, Sheffield, Harmon, Jones, Cranes, Laraut & Hayden.
- Sept. 17 Hauled wheat...2 teams.
- Sept. 21 Hauled wheat 32 sks to Rose & Flock's Mill.
- Sept. 26 Bill and Earn Crane shearing. (sheep)
- Oct. Killed a hog.
- Oct 14, 15 Got lumber from Clark's (Mill).
- Oct. 19 Marked 9 pigs after noon.
- Dec. 19 Killed 14 hogs. Sowed 3 acres oats 4 acres wheat.

July 7 Went to Oakland and got McCormack Binder and Creed Cheenowith and Bates came over to set up Binder.

July 8 Set up Binder and began cutting grain.

July 25 Commercial threshing. Threshed 1100 bushels oats and wheat. Fine day. Threshed for following July 29-Aug. 3 Longs, Burkharths, Marsters, Aldersons, Orcots (Orcutts), Fairfields.

Sept. 3 Hauled school house wood fore noon.

Oct. 17 Worked the colts Fly & Dobie.

Oct. 23 Cut up hog let Mother have 26 lobs. Went to Leo Marsters & borrowed Leo Billie Goat.

Today Hauled posts & pickets for fence.

Nov. 24 Thanksgiving. Worked the filley Fly.

Saturday Shod Dills horse and did sum work.

Nov. 30 Worked at dressing stone for grave. (Sandstone quarry located on Woodruff homestead on the river. Now owned by Youngs. Evan Woodruff was noted for his stonework. Woodruff house, barn, all bldg. foundations are of sandstone)

Dec. 5 Went to Roseburg to serve as a juror. Got there at 8 o'clock.

Dec. 6 Set on jury.

Dec. 7 Set on another jury. Court house burned in the evening.

Dec. 8 Excused as juror. Came home after noon.

Today Cold 19 degrees. Plowed 3 teams clear weather & no fog.

1898

- Dec. 20 Killed 9 hogs.
Dec. 21 Cut up hogs, salted them in the evening.
Dec. 26 Plowed 3 teams, fine day.

1904

- Jan. 26 Plowed 2 teams.
March 16 Took dressed hog which brought me 23.50 weighing 326 lbs. 'The kids have been coming for a week about one fourth of them have died. Have about 20 now alive.

Apr. 16 Went to Roseburg took mohair 518 1/2 lbs. from 126 goats 2 clips sold to L. A. Marsters at 30 cents per #.
May-June Constructing barn and spent time hauling lumber from 'Clarks'. (Clark's Mill located near mouth of Hubbard Creek and Umpqua River. Presently known as McKay Road).
June 13-July 3 (Cut hay during this period using 2 teams and 2 horse drawn mowers.)
July 21 I went to Roseburg Took 1 1/2 tier wood to PLAINDEALER (newspaper).
Aug. 3 Set wagon tires & repaired wagon.
Aug. 23 Went to Roseburg Traded 50 tier wood to Sykes for buggy. (Sam Sykes had a merchantile/ hardware store)
1905
March 17 Began plowing prune orchard. 2 teams.
March 25 The old cow got into the creek. Got her out but her leg was broken so had to kill her.
April 25 Went down to Vinsons and to Umpqua Ferry for lumber got 500 ft. at Umpqua Ferry.
April 26 Went to Clarks for lumber 4 horses.

1905

May 18 Peddled beef.
June 1 Killed beef and peddled it out today.
June 16 Hauled hay 2 teams.
July 6 Alfred took last load of wood to Soldiers Home.
Sept. 18 The men finished shearing goats.
Oct 20,21, 29 Plowed teams
Oct. 24 Went to Longs & brought home 30 bu. Australian
 wheat to sow.Plowed after noon. Oct. 29- 2 teams.
Dec. 1 Dressed stone.

1910

Jan. 4 Plowed after noon 3 teams
Jan. 11 Killed 4 hogs.
Jan. 19 Moved portable fence fore noon. Worked colt after

July 23rd (Susan Woodruff added this last entry.)

John Krohn is managing the farm got through cutting grain
the 19th and commenced the stock on the 21st. Geo. Bacon, Mr.
Owens and Mr. Stiner are helping him.

Aug. 5 Paid Mabel (Woodruff Krohn) for goats that was
sold of Alfs and Mabels. Paid Mabel \$20.

End of Diary

The above information is not the complete diary. Evan Woodruff kept a daily account of his life on the ranch. We have only submitted records covering at least every five years to prove there has continuously been livestock using the creek for watering in Section 13, Twn 26S, Range 7W.

Evan T. Woodruff died in 1910. The estate was not probated until 1927. Page 1 of Mr. Woodruff's will states that his personal property included horses, cattle, goats, and other live stock. This will was recorded in the Probate Wills, V. 5, pg. 512, dated Dec. 21, 1927 in the records of the Douglas County Courthouse, Douglas County Clerk. Page 1 of this record is included with this application.

Evan T. Woodruff was the son of Anthony And Martha Woodruff. Anthony Woodruff was the brother of Jonathan and Mary Ellen Woodruff. Jonathan and Mary Ellen (Donation Land Claim No. 38) sold the land claim to Anthony and Martha for \$1000. This sale took place on Oct. 27, 1856 and was recorded May 4, 1858 in Book 1 of the Book of Deeds, pg. 242 and again recorded March 14, 1864, Douglas County Courthouse. Evan T. Woodruff received his share of the ranch upon the death of his parents, he paid the other members of the family for their share of the property. This is recorded in the probate records, Vol. 8, pg. 496-497, Douglas County Clerks records, Feb. 24, 1885.

An abstract of the property is located at the Douglas County Museum Library in Roseburg.

The A. L. and Ella Mae Young 42 acre property is located in Section 13 of the Jonathan Woodruff D. L. C. Albert L. has lived on the property since 1938 when at that time his parents, Jay E. and Katherine, purchased the total ranch from the heirs of Evan T. Woodruff in 1938. Between the date of Evan Woodruff's death in 1910 and 1938 the ranch was operated by John Krohn and his wife Mabel Woodruff Krohn. The Krohn's son Ralph Krohn states that livestock was always raised during those years of his parents ownership and operation of the ranch. On July 23, 1910, Susan Woodruff added to the diary that, "John Krohn is managing the farm."

A. L. and Ella Mae acquired the property in Section 13 from Jay and Katherine Young in 1950.

The Youngs have raised sheep, horses and cattle since that purchase in 1938. Livestock on the ranch have always watered at the creek located in Section 13 TWN 26S Range 7W.

It has been stated by the Woodruff/Krohn family that Jonathan and Mary Ellen Woodruff stayed in Garden Valley with the Grubbs when they first arrived in Oregon in the early 1850s. The river was frozen during that first winter and they drove the cattle across the river to their land claim at that time. The Grubb D. L. C. is located in Lower Garden Valley.


To Whom It May Concern:

1st. I give and bequeath unto my wife Susan Warren Woodruff, all all my personal property, consisting of Horses, Cattle, Goats, and all other live stock, money, notes and accounts, vehickles, farming implements and all other personal property, to have and to hold the same forever.

2nd. I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife Susan Warren Woodruff all the rents emoluments and profits arising from my Homestead farm situated near Cleveland Post Office, and consisting of parts of Sections Twenty-four and Thirteen, in Township Twenty-six South of Range No. Seven West, and parts of Sections Eighteen and Seven in Township Twenty-six, South, Range No. Six West Willamette Meridian; and the South-east Quarter of the South-east Quarter of Section Fifteen of Township No. Twenty-six, South, Range Seven West Willamette Meridian, and all the rest and residue of any real property which I may have at my death, to have and to hold for her own use and maintainance said rents profits and emoluments during her natural life time, unless she should marry, then from and after the date of said marriage, it is my will that she receive only one third of said rents profits and emoluments from said

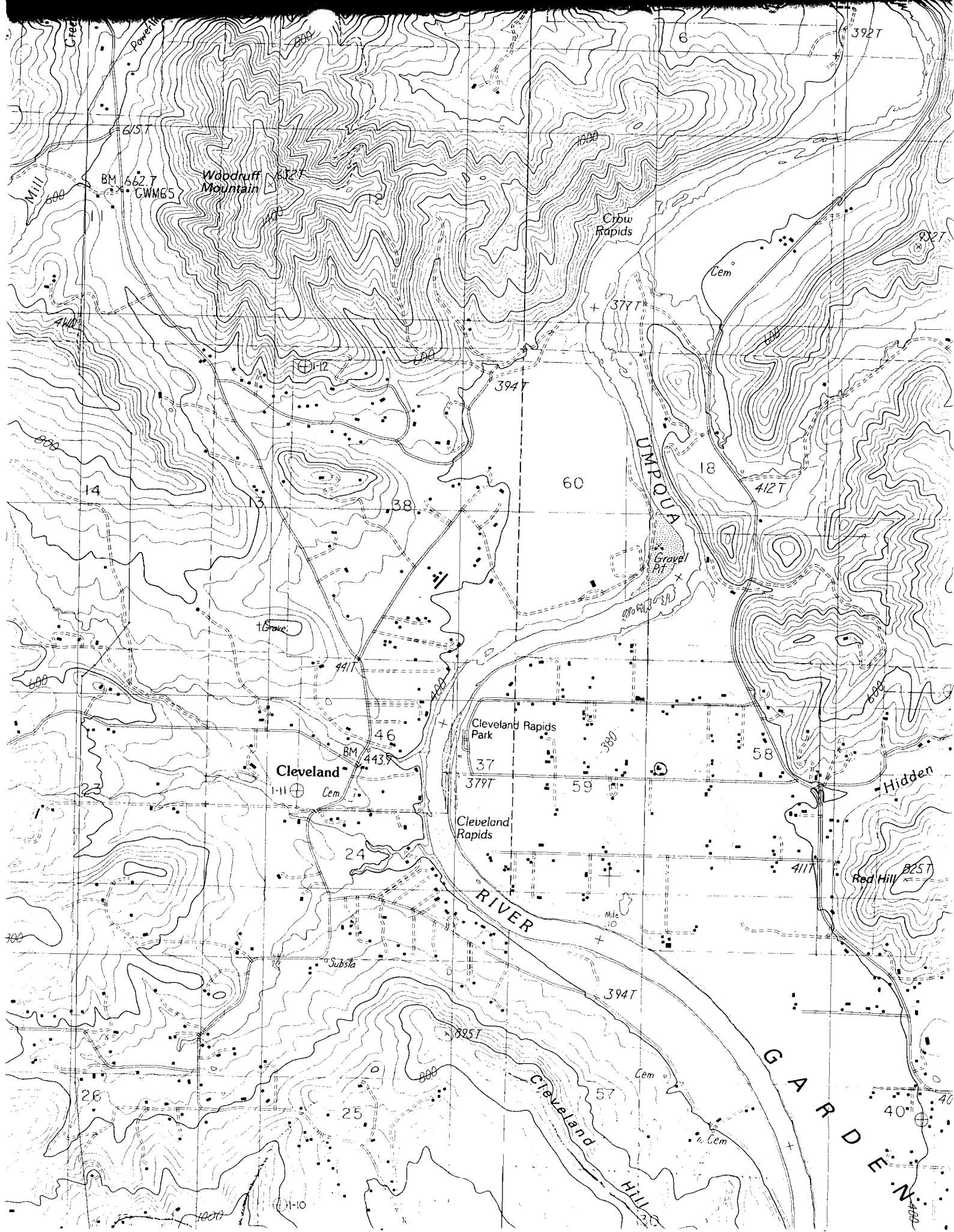
