

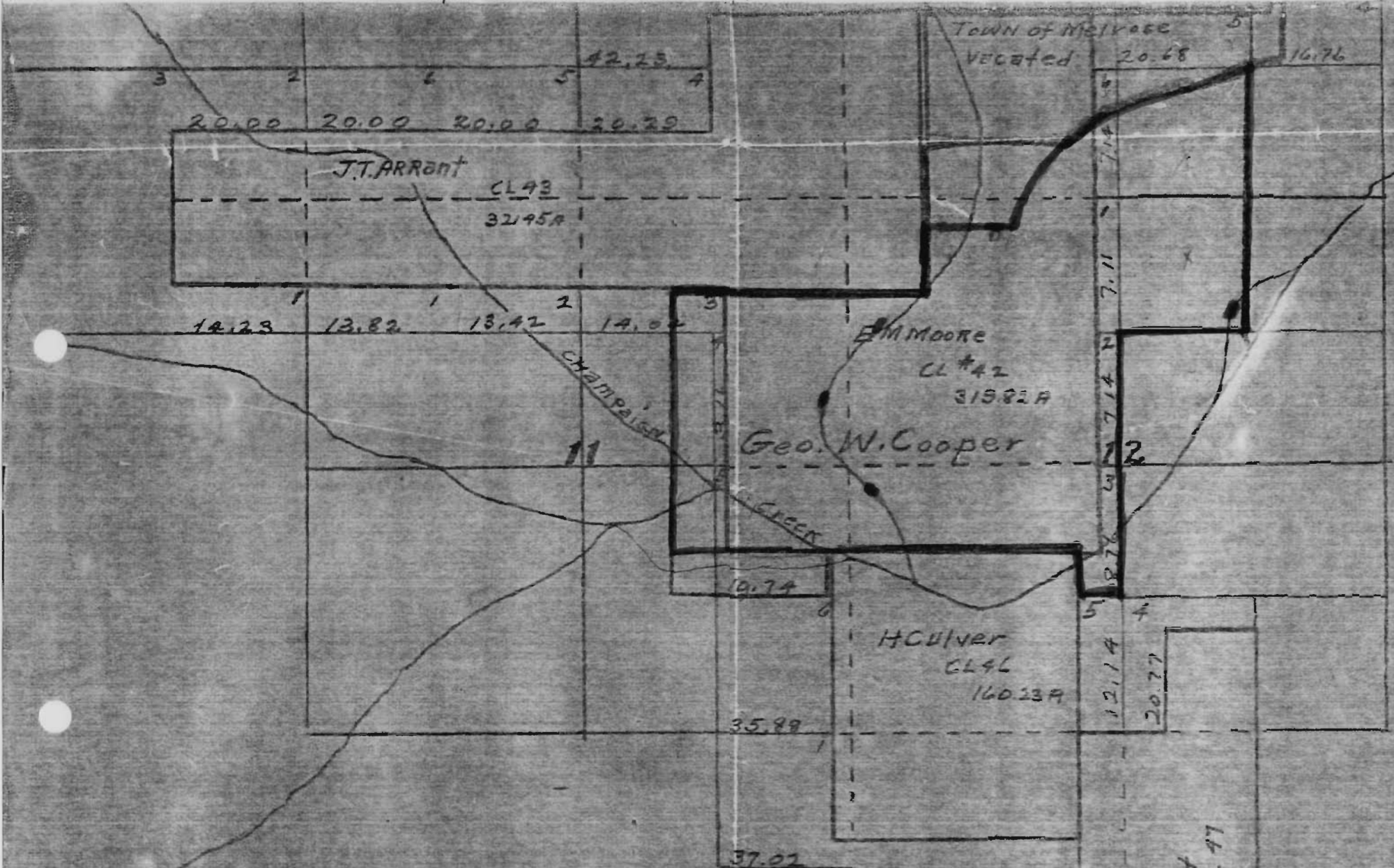

Mr. Chambers' first wife was the mother of our subject at first marriage there were two

Manning worked on the ranch in county with his stepfather until afterward engaged in mining and in Idaho and Montana, following the discovery of gold in those states. He went to Jackson county in the fall of 1852 and subsequently was proprietor of a ranch during most of the period of his residence in Jacksonville but was sheriff of Jackson county from 1874 until 1878. He had been two years in the office, but was cut off from Jackson county. Klamath county was set off from Jackson county two years Mr. Manning conducted a ranch in Klamath Falls and subsequently secured a homestead of one hundred acres, on which he took up his residence in 1890. He also preempted one hundred and sixty acres, thus securing three hundred and twenty acres in all. The tract was settled with sagebrush and he was one of the best settlers of the locality and no other homesteads had been made. His ranch was ten miles south of Klamath Falls. A portion of the tract was disposed of part of this, he now devotes his time to the improvement of the tract. He has one hundred and sixty acres, carrying out general farming. His fields are well cultivated and his methods are practical and produce the results which follow his methods. During the Modoc Indian war he engaged in teaming for the United States government. Jacksonville was the post office at that time and Mr. Manning carried the mail and passengers to Jacksonville. He did an extensive livery business owning stables in that town, and in every business relation he has won the confidence of his diligence, careful management and well directed labors.

Manning was married first to Sarah Jones, a native of Iowa who crossed the river to Rogue river in the '60s and died in Jacksonville in 1878. There were three children of that marriage: Wata A., the wife of J. W. Manning; Fay, of Medford, Oregon; Maggie, deceased wife of Levi Ward; and John, living in Klamath county. In 1878 Manning was again married, his second wife being Belle Galloway, a native of Mississippi, who crossed the plains with her father, Mr. and Mrs. James Galloway. Mr. Galloway, who served through the Mexican war, also through the Civil war, is now in Idaho at the age of nearly one hundred years. Mr. and Mrs. Manning have five children: H. M.; George W., a ranchman in Jackson county; A. J., of Klamath Falls; and Cleveland, who died at the age of

sixteen years; and Frances, the wife of W. H. Wynant, of Klamath Falls. Although Mr. Manning has passed the allotted Psalmist's span of three score years and ten, he is still an active factor in business circles, carefully managing his ranching interests, and whatever success he has achieved in life is attributable to his own industry, determination and perseverance. His straightforward business dealings have gained him the confidence of his fellowmen and made him one of the valued citizens of Klamath county.

JOHN MERIT WRIGHT. The death of John Merit Wright, who passed away in Roseburg on July 19, 1897, deprived the state of Oregon of one of the sturdy pioneers in its settlement, who defied natural forces, endured hardships, privations and defeat and evolved by their own labor out of an uncultivated wilderness and opposing timber forests the fertile land and well developed farms which are making the state prominent among the great agricultural regions of America. Mr. Wright was among the early settlers in Douglas county, his residence in this section dating from 1852. He was born in Kanawha county, West Virginia, June 12, 1826, and moved to Missouri with his parents in 1834. In 1850 he crossed the plains, going to California, where he remained until 1851, when he returned to Missouri. In the following year he again crossed the plains, this time accompanied by his family. He settled in Oregon in the Flournoy valley, Douglas county, whence, after a short period of residence, he moved to French Settlement in the same section and there remained until 1889. In that year he removed to Roseburg, where he lived retired until his death. During practically all of his active life he followed general agricultural pursuits and when he died was the owner of one of the most excellent and most intelligently developed farms in French Settlement.

In Missouri, in 1846, Mr. Wright was united in marriage to Miss Emily Simmons, who was born in Howard county, Missouri, April 20, 1830. Their marriage occurred in Linn county and Mrs. Wright accompanied her husband to Oregon in 1852. Seven children were born to their union: W. T., cashier of the First National Bank of Roseburg; Calvin W., of Marshfield; Lee S., a resident of Portland; Mrs. Rowena L. Jones, of Ronan, Montana; Mrs. L. T. Thompson, of Coles Valley; and Mrs. Alice G. Van Buren and Mrs. Emily Merit West, both of Roseburg. Mrs. Wright passed away at her home in Roseburg in 1902, at the age of seventy-two years. She was the highest type of Christian woman, kind, sympathetic, companionable and generous. Acquaintances immediately became her friends and admirers, her wholesome nature adding to the irresistible charm of her personality.

Mr. Wright gave his political allegiance to the democratic party but never sought public office, preferring to concentrate his attention upon the absorbing duties connected with the conduct of his agricultural enterprise. He was a man of sterling worth, honest in

his convictions and courageous in the support of them. He had few enemies, his rigid adherence to principles of honor and integrity gaining him the respect and esteem of everyone who was in any way associated with him. He was a devout adherent of the Baptist church, having joined that religion in 1845, and lived a consistent Christian life.

MERLE SHELLY KILGORE. The agricultural interests of Klamath county find a worthy representative in Merle Shelly Kilgore. Moreover, he is one of the native sons of the county, having been born in Langells Valley on the 16th of April, 1890. His parents were Silas Wright and Mary A. (Herrin) Kilgore. The father was one of the pioneer settlers of Klamath county and was long identified with stock-raising here but spent his last ten years in retirement. He was the owner of three hundred acres eleven miles south of Klamath Falls, of which he had one hundred and fifteen acres planted to alfalfa. He also engaged quite extensively in stock-raising and at one time had five hundred head of cattle of the Durham breed. In addition to his home place he owned a section of land in Langells valley and at one time resided thereon. He was born near Canton, Stark county, Ohio, July 13, 1842, a son of James and Mary Ann (Dean) Kilgore, natives of Westmoreland county, Pennsylvania, and Stark county Ohio, respectively. The grandparents of our subject were married in the latter county about 1837 and Mrs. Kilgore, who was born October 8, 1819, was of German and English descent. On the 11th of April, 1854, they left Ohio and after a difficult and arduous but safe journey reached Ashland, Jackson county, Oregon, on the 1st of October. Two years later the grandfather rented a farm near Central Point and in 1859 removed to the J. F. Miller farm, two miles north of Jacksonville. He purchased the property and continued its cultivation for a number of years but in the spring of 1873 disposed of his interest and removed to Klamath county. While the Modoc war was in progress he was carrying mail from Ashland, Oregon, to Cedarville, Modoc county, California. In 1875 he returned to Ashland and purchased one hundred and twenty acres adjoining the town. He took up his residence in the town and there lived until his death, December 27, 1887, when he was seventy-six years of age, his birth having occurred in December, 1811. His wife died in Ashland, April 11, 1902. Their children were: Lucetta, deceased; Martha Washington, the widow of Robert Hargadine; Felix, deceased; Silas W.; Amanda, the wife of G. W. Whitmore; Mary, the wife of Henry Duncan, of Langells Valley; James, deceased; Josephine, the wife of A. F. Squires, of Milwaukie, Oregon; and Florence, of Ashland.

When the family settled in Oregon Silas W. Kilgore was a boy of twelve years. He supplemented his education acquired in Ohio by study in Jackson county, Oregon, and in 1862 started out for himself, going to the mines in the eastern part of the state. In

1864 he returned to Jackson county and secured employment as a field hand on a reservation under Capt. Anderson. After two years he moved to a farm and located on a farm under that name, taking up the title at that time. He afterward engaged in stock-raising until his death with deserved success. In the last years of his life he resided in Ashland and passed away July 9, 1901. Mary Alice Herrin, who was born in 1857, and they became the parents of three children. Roy died at Klamath Falls, February 29, 1911, leaving a wife and three daughters, who now reside in Klamath county. The late Mrs. Kilgore in his life he was identified with stock-raising, previous to which he was a stockman. Silas Warren Kilgore was a farmer and stock-raiser. The father left a fortune of seventy thousand dollars to his three heirs, including stock and mills at Bonanza.

Merle S. Kilgore is now the owner of his father's estate, he has 100 acres on the Merrill road of Klamath Falls. Here he has lived for three years and is engaged in stock-raising, farming and irrigation, with a view of enabling him to drain the water of the place and thus by the produce large crops. For many years he has been in the mills but all of his attention is now directed to his farm.

On December 29, 1901, he was married to Miss Mary Emma Butler, born in Ashland, Oregon, and there resided until December, 1901. She came to Klamath county with her parents, Joel Wesley and S. L. Butler. The father was only thirteen years of age when his mother in 1911 returned to Ashland, where she now resides. Mr. and Mrs. Kilgore have an interesting little son, Merle.

In his political views Mr. Kilgore is a republican, giving stamp to the party but never seeking office. He is a young man, able and thorough in sympathy with the northwest and doing much to promote its progress and development. His father was one of the prominent citizens of the county and much for the material development and the work instituted here being carried on by the state.

JOHN P. ANDERSON not only in the sense that he has many advantages but in the sense that he is a descendant against whom was born in Sweden, December 18, 1840, of whom lived and died in Oregon.

ELKTON

Established September 24, 1851. This early day office was so named because it was located near the junction of Elk Creek and Umpqua River in section 19, township 22 south, range 7 west. These two streams provide the major avenues of transportation during the county's territorial days, and their intersection was a logical site for a community.

FRENCH SETTLEMENT

Established August 10, 1874. This post office was so named because a group of French Canadians settled in the locality during the 1850s. The extremely short-lived French Settlement PO was located a few miles northwest of Roseburgh, not far from the place where Champagne Creek flows into the Umpqua River.

GALESVILLE

Established October 14, 1854. The Galesville post office was named in honor of a pioneer settler who was reportedly one of the first two men to settle in the Cow Creek Valley community. This office was located south of Canyonville on the old road to Jacksonville at the point it crossed Cow Creek in the central part of township 32 south, range 5 west. The present-day community of Azalea is a mile or two NE of the site of Galesville.

ALDERBROOK

Established July 18, 1855. The Alderbrook post office was in operation during the last four years of the territorial period in Douglas County, but, unfortunately, very little has been uncovered concerning the naming or location of this office. The name was apparently semi-descriptive, but the location of the Alderbrook post office has not been determined by the compiler.

BUTLER

Established May 27, 1872, by change of name from Drain. The reason behind this name change has not been learned by the compiler. Quite possibly the name honored a local citizen, however it is equally possible that the name commemorated one of the other towns named Butler scattered across the United States. The Butler post office was certainly located in the vicinity of present-day Drain, for John Krewson remained postmaster throughout all the changing of names.

CAMAS VALLEY

Established July 5, 1870. The Camas Valley post office was so named because the Indians once gathered the sweet bulbs of the camas, or lakamass, plant in the valley. The camas plant, a member of the lily family, provided one of the favorite vegetable foods of the western Indian tribes. This post office is currently located near the eastern margin of the valley, about a mile east of Middle Fork Coquille River, and in section 20, township 29, south, range 8 west. Its location has undoubtedly varied slightly with the changing of postmasters.
