At this time water was used for domestic as well as cattle, mules, horses and hogs. The # one Spring was acquired from B. B. Carter whose homestead Certificate shows a 1908 date. That spring continues to be used for cattle and horses.

Spring # 3 is now used both for domestic & cattle, horses, & hogs - the others have been used mainly for animal use since the 3 homesteads were consolidated into one holding prior to the 1909 date.

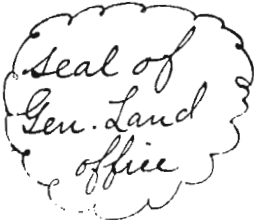

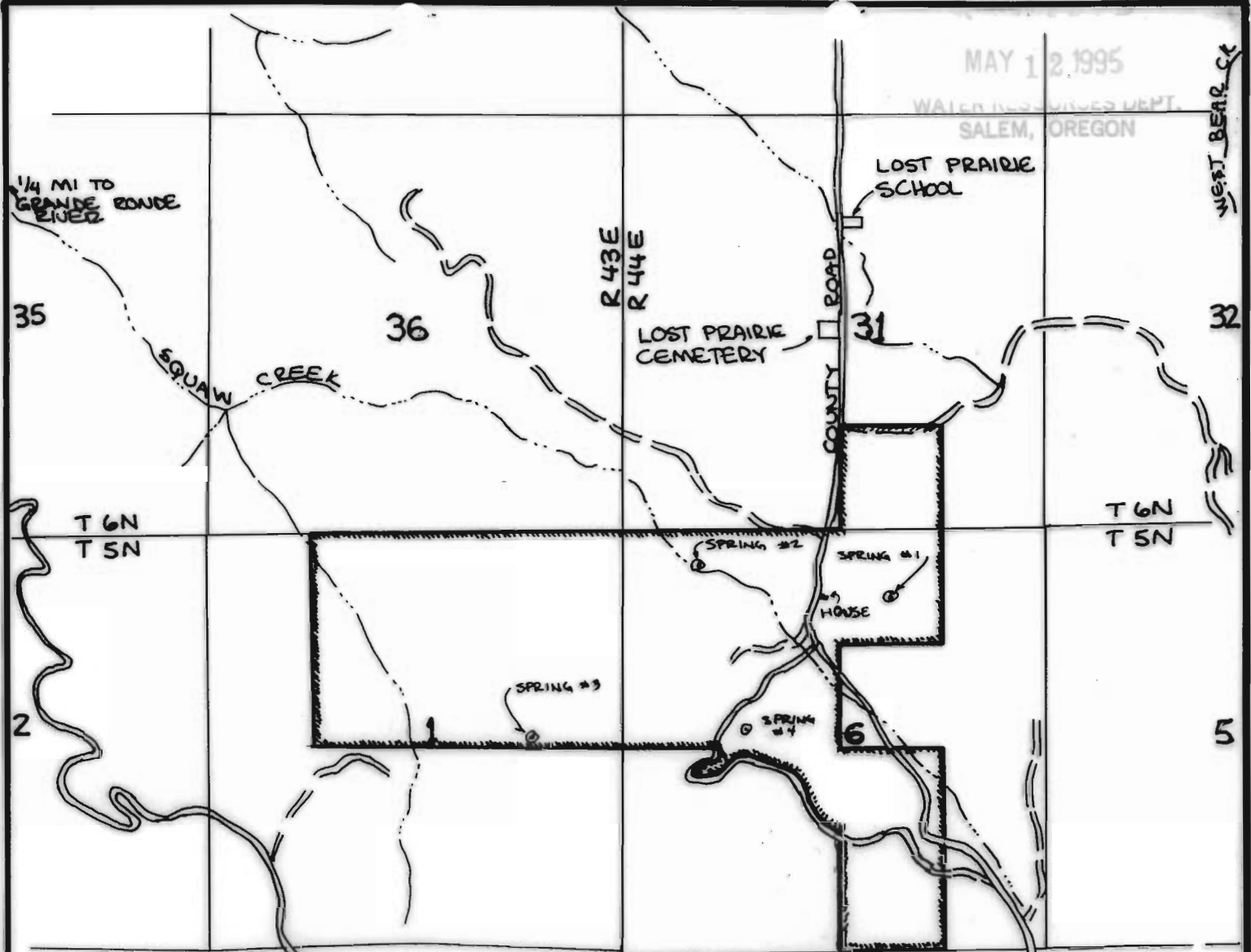



A site inspection of the water uses was made by me, Ralph W. Swinehart, on October 20, 1994. The water uses applied for are from 4 springs on the ranch which flow off the property to drainages of the Grande Ronde River at least part of the year, according to the owner.

Spring #1, known as the house spring, is east of the main ranch house and formerly supplied water to the house and adjacent barns, although a different spring which was developed in the 1940's is now used for these buildings (see spring #4). The spring has now been developed into a small 25 foot diameter 4 foot deep pond which is used for stock water. There is an old concrete spring box with the date 1921 carved in it laying beside the pond. It reportedly replaced the original spring box which served the house. The flow from the spring is sufficient to keep the pond full and have a small seepage from it at this very dry season.

Spring #2, known as the Grandma Coon spring, is just west of the remains of an old log house. It was used as the water supply for this house and reportedly formerly had stock water troughs fed by this spring. At the present time it is developed as a small pit from which stock drink directly. There are no troughs at this time. Flow is about 1 gpm at this time.

Spring #3, known as the old barn spring, has been developed with a concrete spring box connected to a galvanized steel stock watering trough about 15 feet away with a 1 inch galvanized pipe. The pipe is not presently flowing any water and stock waters directly from small pool around the trough as all water is flowing on the ground rather than in the pipe. Flow from the spring is about 1 gpm at this time. The spring reportedly served an old house and barn adjacent to the spring, but there are no sign of the buildings at this time.

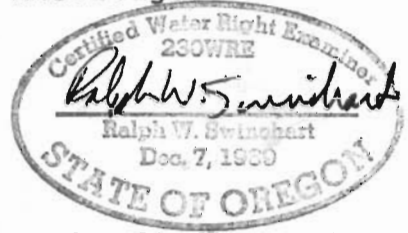
Spring #4, known as the new house spring, has been developed with a concrete spring box and is piped to the main house formerly served by spring #1. The spring is 160 feet higher in elevation than the house and is connected to the house with buried 1 inch PVC pipe. The spring serves the house and barn lots on the opposite side of the road.



The final proof survey and inspection of the uses for a Pre-1909 water right application was completed by me on October 20, 1994 and the facts contained in this report and accompanying final proof map are correct to the best of my knowledge.

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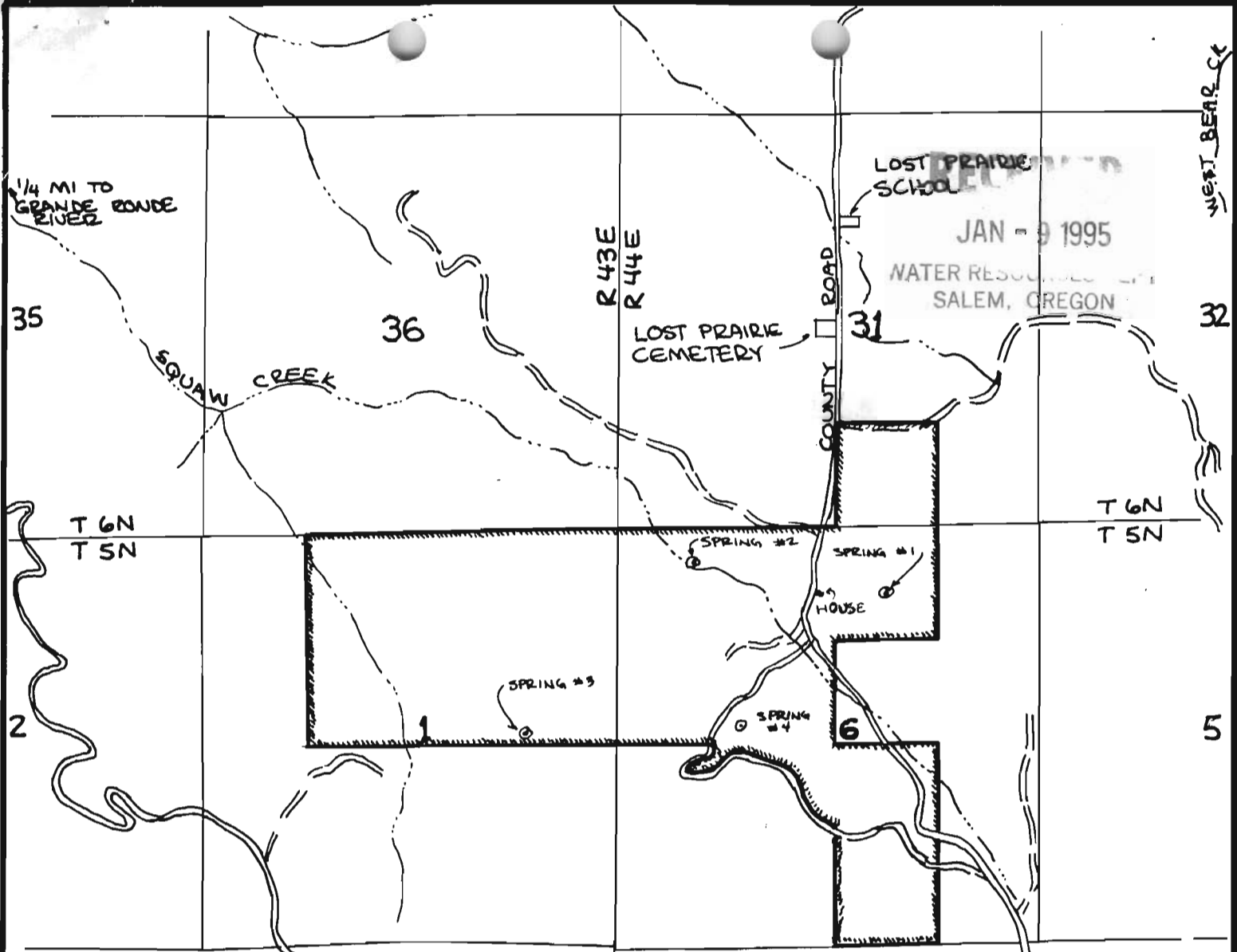

#### LOST PRAIRIE.

What is known as Lost Prairie is a tract of land about eight or ten miles long by five or six miles wide, located in the northwestern part of the county along the Grande Ronde river. It is not, strictly speaking, a prairie country. It is rather a succession of benches separated by canyons. Here there is a variety of climate, caused principally by differences in elevation. The lands on the benches, as well as those in the canyon valleys, are very productive. All the grains and all the fruits and berries that may be grown anywhere else in the county are successfully grown here. It is rich in agricultural possibilities as well as being a good grazing country. There are two school districts here, one in the northern and one in the southern half of the section. A postoffice was established in 1885 with R. H. Bacon as postmaster. Lost Prairie is a very prosperous community and there is certain to be a thriving business center somewhere along the river in the near future.

The first persons to settle in this portion of the county were George Allen and Harvey Wells, who came in 1883. George Allen settled on what is known as the Knight place in Lost Prairie and Harvey Wells in the section now known as Paradise. During January of the next year, Edward Renfrow and L. Wright started with teams and sleds from the lower Wallowa valley. They had located claims the summer before. The snow was at that time five or six feet deep and they were compelled to abandon their sleds at what is now known to all travelers in this section as Sled Springs. The springs took their name from the fact that the abandoned sleds remained by the roadside until just a few years ago. After

abandoning their sleds they constructed "square sleds" by fastening one end each of two poles to the harness of a horse, allowing the other ends to drag on the snow. On these sleds they packed their bedding, provisions and children and after a three days' toilsome march in very severe weather they found shelter at Mr. Allen's place. During the remainder of the winter they subsisted mainly on deer meat and bread.

In 1884 Lincoln Austin built the second cabin in Paradise section and the Lost Prairie settlement was increased by the arrival of R. H. Bacon and son, Lorenzo, Mr. Brown, Mrs. Coon, Jack Miller, James Fleet and Dr. Mason. The following year, 1885, Moses Austin and family and others settled in Paradise and gradually the settlements have grown to their present proportions. The first social event of the north Wallowa settlements took place one Sunday evening in the winter of 1885 at the home of Dr. Mason. Up to this time the only music that had regaled the ears of the venturesome pioneers had been the patter of the late fall rains upon the pine bough roofs, the sighing of the winds through the tall tree tops or the scream of the eagle when close upon his prey. But at this time a homesick boy, Robert Wright, came to the settlements to see his father, Lazrus Wright. Robert was a violinist and he had brought his instrument along. There was great rejoicing over the advent of the violin. A dance was gotten up at once. Invitations were speeded to all parts of the settlements and with one exception every man, woman and child was present. R. H. Bacon was unable to reach the home of Dr. Mason on account of a severe attack of rheumatism. The dance continued as long as darkness lasted. Young and old, the men in rubber boots and plow shoes, flannel shirts and overalls, the pioneers danced as they had never danced before and the event is one that will be about the last to fade from their memories as

common schools and developing those qualities of faithfulness and stability that have marked his subsequent career. At the age of eighteen he came to the west, as far as Harlan, Shelby county, Iowa, whence soon after he went to Minneapolis, Minnesota, and thence to the Yellowstone valley. In the fall of 1882 he came out on horseback the entire distance from Galatin valley to Baker City, Oregon, wintering in that city. The following spring he went to Harney valley, whence in the fall of 1883 he came to Mud flat, in Wallowa county. This was before Wallowa county had a separate political existence, and in January, 1884, our subject having heard that the climate upon Lost Prairie was warmer, the soil richer than other portions of the county, he came hence the entire distance upon snow shoes. Upon leaving Mud flat the snow was five feet deep, but when he arrived at Lost Prairie there was but little snow. Upon investigation he ascertained everything pertaining to the prairie was of the kind to suit him, consequently he returned to Mud flat, loaded his belongings upon bob-sleds and traveled seven days to make the journey from Mud flat to Lost Prairie, the distance being twenty-five miles, and the snow exceedingly deep.

On February 4, 1884, he entered a homestead at his present place, which is eight miles northwest of Flora and two and one-half miles west of Arko, being the first settler in this part of the county. He immediately set to work to improve his homestead, from that time forward. His property consists of the home place of four hundred and eighty acres, which is well improved with an elegant residence, commodious barns and substantial outbuildings, a good orchard; also, a stock ranch about eight miles up the Grande Ronde river, together with a large bunch of stock.

The marriage of Mr. Renfrow and Miss Mary A., a native of Oregon and a daughter of Jackson and Marinda J. (Richardson) Wright,

of Cove, Oregon, was celebrated on June 4, 1886, and to them have been born the following children: Earl J., Earnest R., Clara A., Willis D., Homer E., Elmer J., Franklin D. and Edna M.

Mr. Renfrow produces upon his farm the cereals and all vegetables, while his orchard is composed of peach, pear, apple, cherry, prune and plum trees, together with the smaller fruits, and he is one of the most progressive, enterprising and intelligent and substantial agriculturists of this section of the county. In all the labors of organizing the district and bringing the attendants of civilization to this section Mr. Renfrow has manifested a marked stability and sagacity, coupled with which may be mentioned his unswerving integrity and intrinsic moral worth, which have ever commended him to the good will, fellowship and confidence of his fellows which he enjoys in a generous measure, and which is merited because of his excellent demeanor. He is a member of the M. W. A., at Flora.

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GEORGE M. CANNON.—Any work which purports to give in review the leading points in the career of the prominent citizens of Wallowa county would be open to serious criticism were there failure to incorporate within it an epitome of the life of the esteemed gentlemen whose name heads this article, and who has labored here constantly from the time of the early settlement of the north part of Wallowa county until the present, manifesting, meanwhile, commendable intelligence, activity and energy, together with uprightness and sound principles, which have commended him to the esteem and confidence of his fellows in every respect, and it is with pleasure that we are now permitted to grant him space for the salient points of his life's career.

The birth of George M. Cannon was in Jasper county, Iowa, on September 3, 1863.

being the son of A. L. and Alice Cannon. In 1872 he accompanied his parents to Marion county, Oregon, and in the fall of 1877 he went with his mother to Anatone, Asotin county, Washington. At the early age of ten years our subject started into the battle of life for himself, his first occupation being riding horses, in which he became very expert. He followed this business for a number of years and soon left Asotin county and went to the scene of the construction of the Northern Pacific Railroad from Thompson Falls, Montana, to Sprague, Washington. For a number of years he was found along this line in various occupations, and in 1882 he went back to Turner, Marion county, Oregon, and there attended the high school for two years and more, gaining thus a completion of his education, which had begun years previously. In the spring of 1884, he went to Sutter county, California, being occupied in various work until the fall and then visited his mother in Asotin county, staying there until 1885. In the spring of that year he came to Lost Prairie, landing here on April 1. He worked at various occupations in the county until he was twenty-one years of age, and then entered a homestead at his present place, which is five and one-half miles north of Flora, and one-half mile north-east of Arko. His capital when he came into the county consisted of two horses and one saddle, and an abundance of pluck and two willing hands for work. From that time until the present he has quietly and steadily pursued his way and is one of the prominent agriculturists of the county, having improved his farm with buildings, orchards and so forth, and he is now one of the well-to-do men of this section. His farm consists of two hundred and forty acres and is very rich, the soil producing abundant crops to reward his husbandry. When Mr. Cannon came to this section there were but four settlers on Lost Prairie and he

was one of the early pioneers that opened up to the advent of civilization.

The marriage of Mr. Cannon and Miss Mira F., daughter of James J. and Mary E. Stanley, occurred on November 26, 1891, and to them have been born the following children: Christal, Everett L., Edna, Jetty and Verne. Mrs. Cannon's parents were natives of Ohio, and came to the Wallowa valley in 1883, being pioneers of the county. Previous to her marriage Mrs. Cannon was engaged in the work of instruction in the county, and ranked with the leading educators of this section, having the distinction of teaching the first school in the northern part of the county; also, she worked in the printing office, setting type upon the first paper published in Wallowa county, the Chieftain. 


