We met Mr. Isenhart on the site January 20, 1994 he indicated there had been no deviation in use (domestic, in-stream stock watering, stock tanks, and irrigation) since initiation of development in June 1905 (We are using the most junior priority date). Early irrigation for bottom land crops was accomplished by using a steam engine and pump.

SOURCES:

The sources are: The South Fork of the Coquille River, White Rock Creek, Dement Creek, Russell Creek, Unnamed streams tributaries to White Rock Creek, Dement Creek, And the South Fork of the Coquille River, also the East Fork of Floras Creek and three (3) springs.

DIVERSION POINTS:

#1 Is domestic including .2 acres of lawn and garden irrigation and is an in-stream foot valve connected to an adjacent 3/4 HP electric motor and pump. 250 feet of 1" diameter pipe bearing N66E connect the P.O.D. to the place of use. The P.O.D. is 647 feet West and 1500 feet North of the Southeast corner of Section 6, T 30 S., R 12 W., W.M.. This is an unnamed stream a tributary to the South Fork of the Coquille River.

#2 Is domestic including .5 acres of lawn and garden irrigation and is an in-stream device (6' X 4" diameter perforated plastic pipe buried in gravel in a spring) with a center connected "T" of 1" diameter PVC pipe. The P.O.D. is connected to the place of use by 3850 feet of 1"diameter pipe. The pipe bears S30E for 3400 feet to a 1150 gallon fiberglass storage tank; thence 450 feet on the same bearing to the place of use. The difference in elevation is -475 feet to the storage tank and another -125 feet to the place

of use. PSI at the place of use is 50. The P.O.D. is located 2254 feet East and 1825 feet South of the Northwest corner of Section 7, T. 30 S., R. 12 W., W.M..

#3 Is domestic including .5 acres of lawn and garden irrigation and is an in-stream foot valve with an adjacent gasoline fired Homelite 5 horsepower pump with a 1 3/4" intake and a 1 3/4" discharge line. 115 feet of 1 3/4" diameter pipe bears N60W from the pump to a 550 gallon storage tank. 20 feet of 3/4" diameter pipe connect the storage tank to the place of use. This is on Russell Creek, the P.O.D. is located 1220 feet West and 1940 feet South of the Northeast corner of Section 19, T 30 S., R 12 W., W.M.

#4 Is domestic including .2 acres of lawn and garden irrigation and is an in-stream device (6' X 4" diameter perforated plastic pipe buried in gravel) with a center connected "T" of 3/4" diameter plastic pipe, the pipe runs 20 feet to four 55 gallon drums; thence S37W 450 feet to the place of use. The P.O.D. is located 510 feet East and 206 feet North of the Southwest corner of Section 27, T 30 S., R 13 W., W.M. the system is gravity and there is 40 feet difference in elevation.

#5 Is domestic only and is an in-stream device (6' X 4" diameter perforated plastic pipe, buried in gravel) with a center connected "T" of 1" diameter PVC pipe. The system is gravity flow with a difference in elevation of -30 feet at the place of use. The 1" diameter pipe bears N80W 250 feet; thence N15W 200 feet to an earth spring tank (300-400 gal); thence N35E 100 feet; thence N75E 250 feet to the place of use. The P.O.D. is 780 feet South and 1300 feet East of the Northwest corner of Sec 29, T 30 S., R 13 W., W.M.

#6 Is an in-stream device, (6' X 4" diameter perforated plastic pipe, buried in gravel) the system is gravity and the place of use(stock troughs) is connected to the P.O.D. by approximately 2600 feet of 1" diameter PVC pipe. The P.O.D. is 1500 feet East and 700 Feet North of the Southwest corner of Section 27, T 30 S., R 13 W., W.M.. The pipe bears N65W from the P.O.D and the difference in elevation is -150 feet at the place of use.

#7 Is irrigation for 16 acres of bottom land. The P.O.D. for irrigation is an in-stream foot valve connected by a 6" diameter 20 foot long section of pipe to a 20 horsepower electric pump. The P.O.D. is located 88 feet West and 2518 feet North of the Southeast corner of Section 7, T. 30 S., R. 12 W., W.M..

#8 Is a stock spring with an in-spring device (6' X 4" diameter perforated plastic pipe buried in gravel) connected by a "T" to 1" diameter PVC pipe 30 feet in length leading to a 250 gallon stock tank. The P.O.D. is located 1972 feet West and 1486 feet North of the southeast corner of Section 23 T. 30 S., R. 13 W., W.M.

#9 Is a stock spring with an in-spring device (6' X 4" diameter perforated plastic pipe buried in gravel) connected by a "T" to 1" diameter PVC pipe 30 feet in length leading to

a 250 gallon stock tank. The spring is located 2236 feet West and 1566 feet North of the Southeast corner of Section 23 T. 30. S., R 13 W., W.M.

#10 Is a stock spring with an in-spring device (6' X 4" diameter perforated plastic pipe buried in gravel) connected by a "T" to 1" diameter PVC pipe 30 feet in length leading to a 250 gallon stock tank. The spring is located 3050 feet West and 2216 feet North of the Southeast corner of Section 18 T. 30 S., R 12 W., W.M.

Residence # 1 has a 3/4 horsepower GE electric motor, the ID numbers were unreadable. Residence #3 has a Homelite 5 horsepower pump no ID information was available.

Residence #1 from the pump and 40 gallon storage tank a 1" diameter pipe bears N 66 E, 250 feet to the place of use.

Residence #2 from the P.O.D. a 1"diameter pipe bearing S 30 E, 3400 feet to a 1150 gallon storage tank; thence along the same bearing 450 feet to the place of use.

Residence #3 from the P.O.D. a 1 3/4" diameter pipe bears N 60 W for 115 feet to a 550 gallon storage tank, then 20 feet of 3/4" diameter pipe to the place of use.

Residence # 4 has a total of 470 feet of 3/4" diameter pipe bearing S 37 W from P.O.D. to the place of use.

Residence #5 has 1" diameter plastic pipe and it bears N 80 W for 250'; thence N 15 W 200'; thence N 35 E 100'; thence N 75 E 250 ' to the place of use.

HEADS:

A maximum of sixty (60) Rainbird #30 sprinklers would be in use at one time.

60 Hds @ 6GPM/Hd = 360 GPM

USES:

Domestic, including 1/2 acre of lawn and garden, Irrigation (grass hay), livestock, Instream and troughs.

HEAD:

Domestic # 1 has a +12 foot difference in elevation from the P.O.D. to the place of use. A 1/2 horsepower pump produced 26 to 40 PSI at the place of use. The fluctuation was due to a worn impeller in the pump. Difference in elevation was calculated by using a clinometer and pacing.

Domestic #2 is 125 feet lower than the 1150 gallon storage tank, a PSI of 50 was calculated. The elevation difference was obtained from the Dement Creek Quadrangle map.

Domestic #3 is 25 feet higher than the P.O.D. The elevation difference was obtained by using a clinometer and pacing.

Domestic #4 is 40 feet lower than the P.OD. and the elevation difference was obtained from the Dement Creek Quadrangle map.

Domestic #5 is 30 feet lower than the P.O.D. the difference in elevation was obtained from the Calf Ranch Mtn Quadrangle map.

The stock troughs are 150 - 200 feet lower than the P.O.D. the elevation difference was obtained from the Dement Creek Quadrangle map.

Irrigation - the place of use is 20 feet higher than the P.O.D.. The elevation difference was obtained from the Dement Creek Quadrangle map.

Stranger Dies of Heart Discuse-The Widow Arrives, Caly to Meet. the Funeral Cortege.

Some five weeks ago a stranger came into our neighborhood, who was seriously ill from heart disease, and hoped to obtain benefit here in our mild climate, but death ensued Sunday morning last. The deceased stranger's name was Samuel M. Doment, and his home was at Myrtle Point, Coos county, Oregon. He was 62 years of age, a native of Ohio, and crossed the plains 1853, his being the first white family that settled on the Coquill, in Coos county, Oregon. He was a great lover of the beautiful in whatever beauty appeared, whether animate or inanimate, or in the moral world. We learn from those who knew him that he was charitable and generous almost to a fault-always ready to reliove buman wee whenever opportunity offered. He succeeded well as a business man, and accumulated a comfortable amount of property. He was devoted to his family, seeking constantly such things for them as he deemed would prove most conducive to their highest good. Deceased had been afflicted a long time, hence his death was not a sur prise. He left his family in Oregon and came to this place for relief, but the fell-destroyer had too strong a hold upon life's citadel to be shaken off. Mr. Dement found a home with that generous old settler V. C. Reche, to whom suffering humanity never appeals in vain. Here in this family the dying stranger found sympathy and kind attention, and everything possible was done for his comfort. The best medical aid was had from our resident physician, a generous, Christian man, assisted by a doctor from San Diego. He had with him Mr. Whitney, an acquaintance and a tried friend, who, when he found the sick man must die, sent the sad message to his wife, who started at once on her journey, arriving here Tuesday only to meet the funeral cortege on its way to the grave. We draw a veil over this sad scene of sorrow, and the poor widow's grief, who soon found she was among sympathizwiends, though strangers. At the tomb the grief stricken wife took last forewell of the dead face of he departed husband, of all things most dear. Before the coffin closed, a beautiful floral wreat

other was placed on the grave by the sympathizing hands of the ladies of Fallbrook, and were offered with sisterly feelings toward the sorrowing widow. The deceased was buried with the ceremony of the Methodist Episcopal Church South, the writer officiating. . He leaves a wife and five children to mourn his loss, "He hath. not lived in vain." Pioneer Cattle Man Dies at 3/1/ Home Here

were Funeral services Monday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock from the Schroeder chapel in Myrtle Point, for William Taylor Dement, 75, who died at his home here last Thursday night, after a lingering illness of several years. Rev. C. E. Brittain had charge of the service. Interment was in the Dement plot

at the Norway cemetery.

Mr. Dement was a member of one of the first pioneer families to come to Coos county, his father having settled on Dement Creek in 1854. He was the son of Samuel M. and Louisa Lovett Dement, was born at the family home on Dement Creek, 8 miles south of Myrtle Point, on Nov. 17, 1869, and spent his entire life here. He was married on Dec. 29, 1897, to Miss Nellie Figg of His early education Coquille. was received at the Bunch Academy at Coquille and the Ashland Business College, from which he graduated in 1889.

Taking his greatest satisfaction from the raising of fine cattle and horses, and living the life of the outdoors, he spent more than 51 years in beef production at his ranch on Dement Creek. He was also in business for a time in Coquille and was also interested in the sawmill and other

business.

He served as County Commissioner, as Mayor of Myrtle Point, and as president of the Coos County Fair association, and was known throughout widely county, being remembered for his lively interest in people and his never failing sense of humor, which won him many friends.

For the past ten years he had been confined to his home because of failing vision, but was bedfast for only one day prior to He was 75 years, his death. three months, and five days of

Surviving relatives include his widow, Nellie F. Dement; a son, wallace B. Dement, attorney in Myrtle Point; a daughter, Lieut. Alice L. Dement, USNR, of San Diego, Calif., and a sister, Mrs. John Moomaw of Hubbard, Ore.

In addition to the enclosed papers we also would like to submit record of the brand issued for this ranch as support of the farming and ranching operation which has continued on this place since Samuel M. Dement claimed the property.

Vol. A, Coos County records lists his brand when it was registered at Empire City. That information is further supported by additional Coos County records which also shows the D brand recorded by the county March 13, 1860 in Vol. 41 of Coos County Deeds.

Dement used the brand and the earmark of a crop of the left ear, also shown in the records, until his son R.C. Dement took over the ranch followed by W. Taylor and Wallace Dement prior to our ownership.

A Stranger Dies of Heart Discuse— The Widow Arrives, Caly to Meet the Funeral Cortege.

Some five weeks ago a stranger came into our neighborhood, who was seriously ill from heart disease. and hoped to obtain benefit here in our mild climate, but death ensued Sunday morning last. The decensed stranger's name was Samuel M. Doment, and his home was at Myrtle Point, Coos county, Oregon. He was 62 years of age, a native of Ohio, and crossed the plains 1853, his being the first white family that settled on the Coquill, in Coos county, Oregon. He was a great lover of the beautiful in whatever beauty appeared, whether animate or inanimate, or in the moral world. We learn from those who knew him that he was charitable and generous almost to a fault-always ready to relieve human woe whenever opportunity offered. He succoeded well as a business man, and accumulated a comfortable amount of property. He was devoted to his family, seeking constantly such things for them as he deemed would prove most conducive to their highest good. Deceased had been afflicted a long time, hence his death was not a sur prise. He left his family in Oregon and came to this place for relief, but the fell-destroyer had too strong a hold upon life's citadel to be shaken off. Mr. Dement found a home with that generous old settler V. C. Reche, to whom suffering humanity never appeals in vain. Here in this family the dying stranger found sympathy and kind attention, and everything possible was done for his comfort. The best medical aid was had from our resident physician, a generous. Christian man, assisted by a doctor from San Diego. He had with him Mr. Whitney, an acquaintance and a tried friend, who, when he found the sick man must die, sent the sad message to his wife, who started at once on her journey, arriving here Tuesday only to meet the funeral cortege on its way to the grave. We draw a veil over this sad scene of sorrow, and the poor widow's grief, who soon found she was among sympathizfriends, though strangers. At the tomb the grief stricken wife took last farewell of the dead face of he departed husband, of all things most dear. ber was placed on the grave by the mpathizing hands of the ladies of Fallbrook, and were offered with sisterly feelings toward the sorrowing widow. The deceased was buried with the ceremony of the Methodist Episcopal Church South, the writer officiating. He leaves a wife and five children to mourn his loss, "He hath not lived in vain." He has left behind him that which is rather to be chosen than great riches—a good name.

Tioneer Cattle Man Dies at 3/1/2 Home Here

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock from the Schroeder chapel in Myrtle Point, for William Taylor Dement, 75, who died at his home here last Thursday night, after a lingering illness of several years. Rev. C. E. Brittain had charge of the service. Interment was in the Dement plot at the Norway cemetery.

Mr. Dement was a member of one of the first pioneer families to come to Coos county, his father having settled on Dement Creek in 1854. He was the son of Samuel M. and Louisa Lovett Dement, was born at the family home on Dement Creek, 8 miles south of Myrtle Point, on Nov. 17, 1869, and spent his entire life here. He was married on Dec. 29, 1897, to Miss Nellie Figg of Coquille. His early education was received at the Bunch Academy at Coquille and the Ashland Business College, from which he graduated in 1889.

Taking his greatest satisfaction from the raising of fine cattle and horses, and living the life of the outdoors, he spent more than 51 years in beef production at his ranch on Dement Creek. He was also in business for a time in Coquille and was also interested in the sawmill and other

business.

He served as County Commissioner, as Mayor of Myrtle Point, and as president of the Coos County Fair association, and was widely known throughout the county, being remembered for his lively interest in people and his never failing sense of humor, which won him many friends.

For the past ten years he had been confined to his home because of failing vision, but was bedfast for only one day prior to his death. He was 75 years, three months, and five days of

age.

Surviving relatives include his widow, Nellie F. Dement; a son, wallace B. Dement, attorney in Myrtle Point; a daughter, Lieut. Alice L. Dement, USNR, of San Diego, Calif., and a sister, Mrs. John Moomaw of Hubbard, Ore.



good walking on the creek bottom. The creek was very low. What water there was in it ran next to the bank. Where the tree leaned out far, the top was right over the gravel bar on the opposite side. We went down on the bar so Grandma could see the beast. I told her to stop where we were and I would go a little closer where I could have a good shot at his head.

When I was about ready to shoot, I looked around and there was Grandma right behind me with a big rock in each hand. What she intended to do, I do not know. She was perfectly cool. I shot the panther and it fell on the gravel bar not over a rod from where we were standing. I think that was my first panther. I had helped tree several before but someone else always did the shooting.

(END OF MANUSCRIPT)

After Mr. Dement had written the above manuscript for the Herald, he told the writer many more interesting and historic facts about himself and family and the times in which he was reared. These will be recounted here.

THE LITTLE TOWN IN SOUTHEAST OHIO in which Russell Dement first saw the light of day, Harrietsville, was later swept out by one of the many freshlets suffered by residents of the Ohio river valley. Harrietsville was located approximately 25 miles south of Wheeling, W. Va.

Parents Birthplace

Dement's parents were born near there. His mother was born in Harrietsville, and his father who was of French and Scotch extraction, was born not far from there at the little town of Calais, named after his father's (R. C. Dement's grandfather) birthplace in France.

As there were no pictures taken in Oregon in those days, the only remembrance he carried with him of his mother was the following notation in her own handwriting in a priceless old book, of which more will be written later. "Evil communications corrupt good manners. Caroline ont, Oct. 20, 1855, Russell's creek, Coquille valley." This was written just before the family left the creek on account of the Indian war and went down to Empire where the war was.

Trek To Idaho

The next spring after the panther episode and after father had returned from his trip to Idaho and eastern Oregon, he again had old lady Grant, her son Jay, father of the Grants now living at Gaylord, and her daughter, Julia Ann Grant, who later married Jim Carman, stay on the ranch with my little sister, Nelly, while he and I started out with 150 head of beef cattle on the trail to Camas Valley with the mines at Bannock (now Idaho City) as our ultimate destination. Buena Vista bar adjoined Bannock in the mountains there. Two or three hired cowboys accompanied us as far as Grand Ronde.

We drove those cattle out over the mountains, down through the Willamette valley and over the Cascade mountains on the old Barlow Gate route. Samuel Barlow had made a road through there and put a toll-gate on it. Our family had crossed over this road 12 years before this when coming to Oregon. There was no tollgate then.

TELLS OF TRIP WITH CATTLE TO IDAHO

We took the cattle back over the old Emigrant trail, now the loop roads; there was a good grade there and we didn't notice the mountains. When we came west originally, Laurel Hill, just south of Government Camp, was so steep that we had to let the wagons down with ropes.

On this trip over the mountains, through the wheat country and on up to the Grand Ronde valley where father concluded not to market the cattle that season as they were not fat enough. So we wintered them in the Grand Ronde valley. It was an exceptionally hard winter and we lost 40 head.

The next spring when the grass started up we started out with the cattle, letting them graze now and then at watering places. We drove them slowly so they were in pretty good shape when we got them to the place about five miles east of Boise City. Here we sold some and drove the rest on into the mines, a few at a time, until we had only about 60 head left and these we took 200 miles south to South Boise, where we kept them until winter set in. By this time we had a chance to sell them and started for home, two summers and one winter after we had left Coorcounty. During this entire time we had never slept off the ground and everything we had eaten had been cooked over an open fire. That winter we had a little cabin with a dirt floor on which we slept.

Live Out Of Doors

Everything we ate we cooked in a camp kettle and frying pans ove the campfire. We baked sour dough bread in the frying pan. Food wa high in that eastern country. Flour sold at \$14 for a 50-pound sack an lasted two men three weeks. Sugar and coffee were proportionately high

After selling the last of the cattle and starting home, we came dow to Umatilla landing on the Columbia, not far from Pendleton, and ther we sold the saddle and packhorses and took a boat down to The Dalles then over the portage, and then on another boat down to Portland. Propellers were not in vogue then so the river boats were of the stern paddle wheel type. I decided to stay in Portland and go to school, so entered the Portland academy, a Methodist institution.

Goes To Forest Grove

At first I batched alone and went to school but after a bit I four another young fellow who decided to chip in with me, so I had a partnemost of the winter. I attended school five months and then took a notic to go to Forest Grove. I didn't have much luggage. I went there with n batching partner, Willis J. Dean, who was acquainted in that count and had taught school there. I went to a farmer's place about five mil north of Forest Grove and worked for him most of the summer. Detaught school at Gails creek not far from where I was stopping and went to school to him for a while. He had a pretty fair education.

In the meantime father went east via the Panama route, across t Isthmus, around to New York and back to Ohio and in the spring of 'he brought my stepmother from Ohio by water and across the Panai isthmus. Very few went around the horn at that time. There were borplying on this side and the other side of the isthmus.

Walks Home Weekends

I boarded part of the time with the Chris Lehnherr family and part the time with the Phillips family. They lived on adjoining places. After hool on Friday evenings I walked five miles over the mountain trail, out half the distance through heavy timber. Saturday I would cut and iul wood to last the next week with a yoke of oxen. Sunday evening I ould walk back over the trail to school. I was now 13, and small for my

The winter of 1862 was one to be remembered by all oldtimers. It as noted for cold, snow and high water. Our house was off the ground our feet above the level of the creek bottom land. About the last of Novnber '61 the hills and mountains were covered with snow to a depth of eet. Then came a warm south wind. It commenced early in the iorning and blew as hard as I have ever seen it blow. It blew down lots f green timber. At noon it was all over and then the warm rain comrenced. It was a steady downpour that lasted about 12 hours, before it uit, leaving water all over the bottom lands and four feet deep in our ouse.

We had a little smokehouse back of the house nearby on the hillside nd we moved everything we could into it. Mother and I were alone at he time. Father had gone into the Sixes mines the day before with a few ackhorses loaded with pork to sell to the miners.

Debris Blocks Trail

The trail was so blockaded with fallen timber that father didn't get 10me for several days. Up to that time we had not raised or prepared any vinter feed for our stock. At that time there wasn't such a thing as a parn in the country. That spring, 1862, my mother took sick and in May passed away.

Now my troubles began! All my life I had been right with my mother. She had taught me how to cook, which was a lucky thing, as father knew nothing about it, and there was no one to get to help, so we had to ig the best way we could. I was in my 15th year and my little sister. Nelly, was in her sixth. It was up to Russell to keep house, cook, wash and iron. Very little of the latter was done.

Father Goes To Idaho

I also had to help with the outdoor work — cut wood, milk cows, hoe in the garden and cornfield. We got along somehow the first year. The spring of '63 father conceived the notion of taking a few beef cattle that we had and some of the neighbors' and driving them to the gold mines in Idaho that had been discovered the year before. There was a big rush from the western coast to these mines.

Well, he took 60 head of fat steers. A young man by the name of Tom Hart who wanted to go to the mines, helped him drive them there. There was a family by the name of Grant that had settled on the river above us - a widow woman, one son, O. J. Grant, and a daughter, Julia Ann Grant. O. J. like all young fellows in the country got the gold fever and struck out for the mines. Father made arrangements for the mother and sister to make their home at our house. While he was gone that was a great relief for me to have someone to keep house and take care of Nelly.

Attends School

Miss Julia Ann Grant taught school in our district that summer.

My sister attended the school and I did part of the time; my being the only man on the ranch made my attendance somewhat irregular. We milked a few cows and made some butter the old fashioned way with the dash churn. We made some to sell. I took that on packhorses to Sixes miners, two days hard riding over the mountain trail to the mines and back.

I was now in my 16th year and a good shot with a rifle — all muzzle loaders with caplocks very accurate up to 100 yards. The only recreation I had was to go hunting on Sunday or get some of the neighbor boys and

go swimming. Up to that time I had killed elk, deer and bear.

I must tell of the first panther I killed. We had two pastures, one on each side of the creek. On the west side the prairie open land came down to the creek. On the east side there was a strip of timber and brush about 100 yards wide with gradual slope to the prairie. There was a fence on the east side to separate the pastures, no fence on the west side. The stock could get to the water without any trouble.

Water Is Scarce

After the winter and spring ceased the water on the east pasture was scarce. I would have to drive the cows out to water everyday. I concluded I would fence part of the creek at one place so I could open the gate and let the cows go to water where they pleased. I found a place where the creek bank was high and steep on the west side and there a tree of considerable size had fallen across the creek. The top connected with the steep bank on the west side. With my axe I cut poles near by and soon built a fence or blockade on the log. This was the lower side of my project, and 15 or 20 feet above I got rails, cut and carried poles and soon had the job completed. This was 300 or 400 yards up the creek from the house.

Now I shouldered my axe and started, proud of my job. As I went by I glanced on the log where I had done my first work on my project and there lay a pig panther. He had got on the butt of the log in the edge of the brush and crawled there without my seeing him. The first thing I thought of was my dog, Scot, and he was not in sight. I knew he was somewhere around as he was always with me. I called a time or two. The panther never moved. But we didn't have long to wait, the panther and L. Scot had been out in the woods, struck the panther track and followed him to the log.

Dog Corners Panther

About the time the dog struck the log, the panther saw him. He didn't seem to want to come over in the open where I was nor did he want to face the dog. He was not long in making up his mind, however, and jumped quartering downstream onto the bank. Next jump then was on the fence and there the dog nailed him and pulled him down, top rails and all. Though Scot was a large, powerful dog, he was no match for that panther except in courage. The cat knocked him loose and ran up a myrtle that leaned out over the creek.

Now I was coming to the part that was most interesting to me. I knew the dog would keep the panther up the tree 'til I could go to the house for a gun. Grandma Grant was alone. Her daughter, the teacher. and my little sister were at school. I asked Grandma if she would like to see a live panther and she said she would. By this time I had shot pouch and gun in hand and we were where we could hear Scot barking. It was
