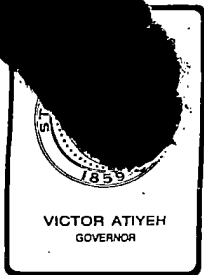

REFERENCE: Files Numbered 4647, 4649 and 7619

In response to your letter September 29, 1980, regarding any applications involving the appropriation of the waters of Long Creek and Coyote Creek I have made the following observations.

Certificates have been issued on all three of the files you mentioned in your letter: Permits 3667, 3669 and 25658. Notations regarding the allowances under those certificates are shown on the accompanying maps with the acreages allowed thereon. Another file under application number 29461 and permit number 23241 was issued a certificate number 29528 to Weyerhaeuser Timber Company. This certificate allowed 0.33 c.f.s. of water from Long Creek and 0.33 c.f.s. of water from Coyote Creek for road sprinkling with a priority of September 8, 1954.

An incomplete application number 6475 was filed by the U. S. Indian Irrigation Service without fees on April 7, 1919. No permit has been issued approving this application. Two other files were listed in this area 13952 and 13953 both filed on February 11, 1931 by Kesterson Lumber Company for steam power, domestic and stock use. These applications were later withdrawn by the applicant and of course permits were never issued.

Application 4650 permit 3670 and application 4651 permit 3671 were requested by the Chewaucan Land and Cattle Company but was subsequently canceled and of course no effect. The only other filing I found was a new application 60017 in the name of Freemont National Forest which you are aware has been protested by the ZX Ranch and Colohan Enterprises. These ten filings are the only ones that I found relative to Long Creek and Coyote Creek. I hope this gives you the information you needed.

Gentlemen:

In digging through some old files of the Chewaucan Land & Cattle Co., I find a notice of beginning of construction by the company of ditches covered by Application #4649, Permit #3669, and also reference to Application #4647, Permit #3667 and an Application #7916, also erroneously referred to as #7619. These all seek to appropriate the water of Long Creek which was a tributary of the Sycan River which flowed across the Klamath Indian Reservation.

Apparently Silver Lake Irrigation District had ambitions to take the water of Long Creek and Coyote Creek over the hill and into the Thompson Reservoir, but such ambition was never accomplished.

Can you tell me the status of these applications according to your records. Also, the date of any other application on Long Creek or Coyote Creek which might be prior in time to these applications. In other words, what is the status as shown as shown by your records for the waters of Long Creek and Coyote Creek, all of which, I think, flowed into the Sycan Valley across Reservation land. If there are any copies of permits or applications or final proof that I should have, advise me of the cost so that I can send you the necessary funds.

Dear Sir:

I am in receipt of your letter of November 14th making application for permit to appropriate water. Your letter has been considered and application numbered 7619 and application blank is returned herewith for completion, maps and fee.

I have partially filled out the application blank from permit No. 890 but questions 5,6,7,8,9, 10,12,13,14 and 15 should be answered, and the application should be signed and should bear the signature of witnesses. Under question 9 the number of acres to be irrigated within each forty acre tract should be set forth.

The fees on this application are a \$3.00 examination fee and recording fees amounting to \$9.00 for the irrigation of 60 acres. You will note from the instructions that map is required to be filed with the application which should show the application of the source of supply, the location of the point of diversion, the location of the ditch lines and the number of acres within each forty acre tract which are to be irrigated. In order to retain its original date of priority this application should be returned to this office accompanied by the required fees and map on or before December 18, 1920.
